In Eastern Townships a freight lot was sold to a Bonaventure market dealer at 18c, whilst choice selections have changed hands at 22c to 23c. In Western, choice lots are held at 18c, whilst less desirable lots are quoted at 14c to 16c. There is some Kamouraska offering, but the demand is light. Stocks are not very heavy, although they are ample for current needs.
