Hon. G. J. McIlraith (Minister of Public Works): Mr. Speaker, the hon. member asked whether a decision had been made to move the Department of Public Works staff from North Bay to Sudbury. The answer to that question is no, there has been no such decision taken. Perhaps I should add, to assuage any doubts that may be in the hon. member's mind or the minds of those involved, that formerly the North Bay office of the Department of Public Works was required to report to the district office in Toronto. We are creating a new district office in Sault Ste. Marie in relation to a certain portion of northern Ontario, and the North Bay office in future, along with the Port Arthur office, will be required to report to that new district office. It may in its working out involve some changes in personnel, but there is no intention to close the North Bay office.

Hon. J. W. Pickersgill (Minister of Transport): Mr. Speaker, it is not only the hon. gentleman's constituents who would like to be allowed to sleep in peace. About once a month I get a telephone call at about three o'clock in the morning from some irate person in the hon. gentleman's constituency asking why jets are allowed to land at Dorval after midnight. I do not like having my sleep disturbed any more than the people there do.

A very serious effort is being made to prevent, to the greatest possible extent, these landings and takings-off after midnight. There have been a large number of landings and takings-off recently because of the inordinately large amount of air traffic.
