

1970, 13,731 persons in Bonavista-Trinity-Conception were in receipt of assistance shareable under the Canada Assistance Plan. This figure includes 6,844 long-term and 6,887 short-term recipients. (b) As of May, 1970, the total number of persons in receipt of assistance was 87,294 of whom 47,075 were long-term and 40,219 were short-term recipients. In the long-term group there were 9,697 family units and 5,575 single person units. In the short-term group there were 6,658 family units and 1,034 single person units.

2. (a) Federal payments to Newfoundland under the Canada Assistance Plan amounted to \$20,289,000 for the fiscal year 1969-70. (b) Estimated federal expenditures under the Plan for the fiscal year 1970-71 are \$22,966,000.

3. 31,619 as of April 30, 1970.

4. Persons 65 years of age and over who were formerly granted assistance under the Old Age Security Act are now receiving pensions under the Old Age Security Act.

2. What was the initial cost of the equipment?
3. What yearly costs are anticipated for data processing in the Department?

Hon. Ron Basford (Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs): 1. Yes. From January 1, 1970. The equipment is an IBM 6430 System.

2. As this equipment is being rented, there was no initial capital outlay on it.

3. Expected yearly operating costs for this equipment are for rental fees (\$10,800); punch cards (\$400) and paper (\$200) for a total estimated cost of \$11,400. In addition the Director of Investigation and Research rents time on the IBM 360 System, Model 65, operated by the Computer Services Bureau. It is estimated that the yearly expense will be \$2,800.
