## WESTERN DIVERSIFICATION FUND

USE OF MONEY FOR PROGRAMS AND PROJECTS

Mr. Lorne Nystrom (Yorkton—Melville): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Right Hon. Prime Minister. It concerns the Western Diversification Fund recently announced by the Government. As the Prime Minister is aware, many western Canadians are suspicious that this might be a second curtain call of the empty Liberal Western Development Fund of Allan MacEachen in the early 1980s.

Some \$79 million has been taken out of the fund for the South Moresby National Park and another \$54 million for the Salmonid Enhancement Program. Just how much of that fund has already been committed to previous government programs and how much money will be left for small business and new projects?

Hon. Bill McKnight (Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development): Mr. Speaker, I am surprised that the Hon. Member now takes the opportunity to criticize the Liberal initiative which he supported at the time it was announced. The initiative that was announced by the Right Hon.
