have returned partially unable to resume their ordinary work. It is perfectly right for me to say that when our men come back to the Eastern Townships we would prefer to see them located in a home in the Eastern Townships rather than anywhere else in Canada. That is what I have in mind, honourable gentlemen, when I say that we ask the Government to consider carefully the utilization of that institution by establishing in connection with it a home for those of our men especially who were engaged in agriculture before they went to the war, and who when they come back may be unable to return home to take the care and control of a whole farm, but could be useful in aiding in the development of that institution, situated among the hills and mountains of the Eastern Townships, in which they would be happier, enjoy life and regain their health more quickly than in any other spot on earth.

Honourable gentlemen, if I am in order to do so, I would move that a committee composed of two members from each side of this House be appointed for the purpose of investigating this matter—a committee composed of the honourable senator from De Salaberry (Hon. Mr. Béique), the honourable senator from Rigaud (Hon. Mr. Boyer), the honourable senator from Bedford (Hon. Mr. Pope), all of whom I know to be interested in agriculture; and I should be honoured to be a member of that committee; and I would suggest that the committee investigate the situation at Lennoxville and consider, with the other members of this House, the further enlargement of the scheme, in order that the idea which I have briefly outlined to you may be carried out. Later other farms can be utilized.

Hon. Mr. LANDRY: I suppose that this motion will be in sequence to the first motion moved by the honourable gentleman.

Hon. Sir JAMES LOUGHEED: My honourable friend has asked in his motion for certain information and I have very great pleasure in placing this information upon the Table.
