## STANDING RULES.

N the subject of Private and Local Bills, adopted by the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly, 3rd Session, 5th Parliament, 20th Victoria, 1857.

1. That all applications for Private and Local Bills for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatsoever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require the following notice to be published, viz :—

In Upper Canada—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties, affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspayer in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

In Lower Canada—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, or in both languages if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both hinguages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in in adjoining District.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the presentation of the Petition.

That before any Pecition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the crection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to this House, the person or persons purposing to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving the notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give a notice in writing, stating the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a draw-bridge or not, and the dimensions of such draw-bridge.

3. That the Fee payable on the second reading of and Private or Local Bill, shall be paid only in the House in which such Bill originates, but the disbursements for printing such Bill shall be paid in each House.

4. That it shall be the duty of parties seeking the interference of the Legislature in any private or local matter, to file with the Clerk of each House the evidence of their having Ordered—That in future all Candidates for admission into this Society as Students of the Laws, who desire to pass their Examination in either the optime Class, or the Scaler Class, do attend the Examiner at the Class, the University Class, or the Scaler Class, do attend the Examiner at the Complete Listican both the first Thursday and the first Friday of the Term in which their petition, for admission are to be presented to the Benchers in Convertion, at Ten orders 4. M. of each day: and those for admission in the Junior Class, on the latter of those days at the like hour.

That the foregoing Rules be published in both languages in the Official Gazette, over the signature of the Clerk of each House, weekly, during each recess of Parliament.
