## Political Intelligence

Forty Liberal candidates in Ontario have already been nominated for the coming election and the list of nominees has been arranged as follows:

To-day—North Perth at Milverton; South Perth at Mitchell; Wednesday, Nov. 1—South Huron at Havelock; Wednesday, Nov. 1—Centre Bruce at Kincardine; Thursday, Nov. 2—West Lambton at Sarnia; Friday, Nov. 3—Prescott at Van-Wick Hill.

The annual meeting of the General Reform Association will be held in the Temple Building next Tuesday at 10 a.m.

Hon. George E. Foster will be nominated by the Toronto bye-election in St. Paul's Hall at noon to-day. A. H. Birmingham stated yesterday that so far he has not heard of any opposition to the new minister of trade and commerce.

R. F. Miller, Liberal candidate, has filed a petition against the election of F. R. Laird, Conservative member for Hamilton.

Rumor has it that Hon. A. G. MacKay is to step aside at the coming convention of Ontario Liberals and that W. R. Howell, K.C., is to be chosen leader and to be given a nomination in Middlesex County.

T. W. McGarry, M.L.A. for Renfrew, is in Toronto, seeking to secure from the Provincial Government some relief for the public school teachers of Renfrew, who were burned out in the recent fire there.

Albert Grigg of Bruce Mines, Altona, who was renominated by the Conservatives a few days ago for the legislature, says that so far there is no Liberal in sight to oppose him at the coming election. He thinks the Conservatives will be thru by Nov. 15, so that after appeals are heard, the entire preparation of the lists should be finished by Dec. 1.

OTTAWA, Oct. 26.—(Special).—Capt. W. H. Bowie, deputy-sergeant-at-arms, has been appointed to the office of Speaker of the house of commons. The appointment was made by Dr. Sproule, who has been deputy-sergeant-at-arms for 20 years.

Capt. Hon. Sam Hughes will attend the Thanksgiving Day manoeuvres at Hamilton on Monday next, leaving Toronto that evening for the trip to which he will pay an extended visit.

Premier Borden returns to the capital on Monday, where a banquet will be tendered him. He will be accompanied by Hon. Meade, Cockburn, White, Reid, Nantel and Hazen.

There is a general chorus of ministers to-night for the bye-elections.

PRESIDENTIAL TO PRIVATE CLIFFORD.

After the inspection in battalion and company drill of the Grenadiers at the armories last evening by Col. John Pte. W. J. Clifford was presented with an address and a purse of money by the sergeant-major, warrant officers, staff sergeants and sergeants in honor of his success at Bletley in the "Prize of Wales" prizes.
