The Air That Puts Out Miners'

Normal air contains about 21 per cent. of oxygen and 0.05 per cent. of carbon dioxide, and to determine how greatly these proportions are changed when the air ceases to support combustion was the purpose of the experiments lately brought to the notice of the Coal Mining Institute of America by G. A. Burrell.

Different lamps were placed under a 10-quart bell iar until their flames were extinguished, when the air was analyzed. A bonneted Wolf lamp went out when the atmosphere contained 16.5 per cent. of oxygen and 3 of carbon dioxide; an unbonneted lamp of the same kind in an atmosphere of 15.82 per cent. of oxygen and 3 of carbon dioxide, and a candle flame with 16.24 per cent. of oxygen and 2.95 of carbon dioxide.

A natural gas flame from the Bunsen burner was stated.

A natural gas flame from the Bunsen burner was extinguished in 13.9 of oxygen and 3.25 of carbon dioxide.

The flame of an acetylene lamp continued until the oxygen was reduced to 11.7 and the carbon dioxide was increased to 6.30, or much beyond the point where the atmosphere became dangerous, to human life.

The Medicinal and Food Value of Seaweeds.

Seaweeds having been suggested as a possible source of future wealth, especially for food products, Perrot and Gatin, two French oceanographers, give some facts concerning present uses. In Europe, they are collected for their alkalies, and iodine, for which their are chiefly valued. In some localities they are popular medicines, one kind being employed as a vermifuge in corsica, and others, on account of their iodine, being given in goitre and scrofula.

is even extensively cultivated to give
