COLONIAL RECIPROCIITY

WILL BRITAIN COME IN?

Australian Addresses Unionist Meeting—Imperial Confederation of Journalists.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable)

London, Aug. 29.—John E. Sutherland, Liberal candidate in Elgin, in the course of an address to his constituents, said that what they all wished to benefit the colonies, neither Canada nor Australia would consent to forego their tariff advantages against the British manufacturer.

W. J. Carter of Victoria, Australia, addressing a meeting in Elgin in the United States, said that Canada, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa were beginning to find it in accordance with their best interests that they should be reciprocally benefited.

At the annual conference of the Institute of Journalists at Bournemouth, in the course of which they wished to establish closer relations with their brethren in the Empire, the executive committee has addressed a number of circulars to journalists throughout the Empire, which were already bearing fruit, as satisfactory replies had been received.

There was every reason to believe that certain difficulties of organization in the way would be overcome, and that a great journalistic federation, empire-wide, would before long be formed.

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
