SOO LOAN FALLS DUE.

Government Makes Provision to Review if it is Not Paid.

Hon. Col. Matheson announced in the legislature last night that the guarantee of \$2,000,000 of the bonds of the Soo industries would expire on Tuesday next. He had every reason to hope that the provision would be relieved, but provision would have to be made to renew all or a portion of the stages, providing for the renewal. In case the whole loan was not repaid the government would hold the securities of the Algoma Central Railway, but would release the other securities, consisting of first mortgage bonds of the Lake Superior Company or stock in proportion to the amount taken up.

The license commissioners were in session yesterday to decide as to the issuing of licenses for next year. They will continue deliberations to-day. In the meantime no statement is to be had, though it is expected that six of the present license-holders will be given 30 days to sell out, and that another six will be given 60 days for the same purpose.

CITY'S RIGHT TO BUY LINES BOUGHT BY STREET RAILWAY

Private Bills Committee Want More Data Before Making Decision.

The propriety of the city's request to be allowed to construct street railway lines of its own on streets where the company refused to lay them down produced a spirited argument before the private bills committee of the legislature yesterday, when Toronto's bill to buy the Metropolitan and the Board of Control were presented with City Solicitor Chisholm and E. B. Ryckman as legal counsel; while H. S. Osler, chairman of the committee, was the opponent.

Chairman Carscallan said that the committee should go slow in dealing with a clause that might upset the company's sacred contract with the city, and Mr. Mackay foresaw troubles to ensue for everybody. Hon. Mr. Carscallan strongly supported the city's contention. By allowing what was asked, the company would have to lay down lines on streets desired, and said it proposed to object while the city could now give another company the right to operate lines, the city was not empowered to build and operate lines itself. Mr. Osler objected that the addition of the clauses would further complicate the argument, and said when drawn up, there was no intention of the city going into railway operation. Citizens' money would be spent irrespective of whether it meant the purchase of the company, he asserted. The city, he claimed, would give competition on streets where no private company would do so. Mr. Carscallan asked the lines wouldn't give seating room to strapholders, the reply being that the company would not oppose lines on streets where business justified them. Mr. Osler gave warning against its being assumed that the company would stick to the contract while important judgments on the point were lacking, whereon Mayor Coatsworth reminded that the supreme court was dealing only with the city's power to order tracks on territory annexed since the agreement was made.

Chairman Carscallan thought the city should be content to have discourse through the courts. It was agreed that the city should submit a plan showing the extent of proposed lines before the clause in the bill was passed. The committee, while approving expenditure in preparing a suitable site for the lines, advised that the city should not take on the contract for construction works, but of Cherry-st. knocked out the general request for power to spend \$400,000 in making Ashbridges marsh suitable for factory sites, including the right to lay down a spur railway line.

Mayor Coatsworth, appealed for a prompt solution of the radial railway problem, on the clause, asking that the city have the right to construct tracks of standard gauge for the entrance of radial lines, coming up. It was referred to the railway committee.

No decision was reached on the application of the city for the privilege of selling feed at the western cattle market. Property Commissioner Harcourt said the city's power to make money, but to improve the market. The clause giving to D. The report of the president, Mr. Chas. M. Swift, states that the construction probably will be completed within two or three months, and that the proceeds of the bonds already issued will discharge all present construction obligations.

A franchise has recently been issued to the president for the building of a suburban line to Fort McKimley and Paslin, plans for financing this project have not been fully completed, but it is expected that all, or a large majority, of the stock of the company formed for the purpose of building the same will be acquired by this grant, the Manila Electric Railroad & Light Co. has been authorized to extend its tracks to the new port works, and also to carry freight.

The rights thus acquired, together with the earnings of the Fort McKimley-Paslin extension, will, it is expected, add substantially to the gross net earnings of this corporation.
