Hereafter Be Refused.

Seven horses started for the steeplechase
at Sheepshead Bay on Saturday, with Red
Pat a heavy favorite. After going about
half way he fell heavily, striking Dunlop
a very severe shaking up. Lion Heart, with
Que Hamilton up, made all the running.
The horse tired badly, for he was made
to stop when he was running a mile from
home. He kept on, but every jump was
taken in a scrambling way.

At the last jump, however, it looked as
if St. Anthony, who was second, could
not catch him. Hamilton, however, seemed
too tired to help his horse home, and
Chandler, coming on St. Anthony with a
rush, nailed him half length. Chandler was
a distant third on Winslip.

All these jockeys and the trainers were
put under investigation at once by Messrs.
Howard, Keene and Follenbaker, the stew-
ards, with the result that the future en-
tries from the Wellington stable, under the
rules of the National Steeplechase Asso-
ciation, will be refused, and that the
license of G. Hamilton is revoked. The
Wellington stable headquarters are in
Toronto. The string includes, besides
Lion Heart, St. Anthony and Chandler.

WHEELMEN AT BUFFALO.

Surprises on the Track—John A. Johnson
and Frank W. Ryan—
Michael's Record.

Buffalo, Sept. 7.—The bicycle races held
under the auspices of the Ramblers' Bi-
cycle Club attracted 10,000 people to Buf-
falo Athletic Field this afternoon. The
weather and track were perfect for good
racing. Among the professionals entered
were John A. Johnson, Minneapolis, and J.
W. Parsons of Australia. Johnson suc-
ceeded in capturing the one-mile profes-
sional after a hard struggle with Parsons
and Werke of Buffalo. Parsons was beat-
en for second place by a few feet only.

One-mile handicap, Johnson started from
scratch, but was unable to catch the lead-
ers, and gave it up after the third lap.
Davis of Buffalo, from the 80 yard mark,
won the race. Parsons did not start in
this race. In the two-mile handicap Par-
sons and L. A. Callahan started from
scratch. They set the pace for each other
alternately and succeeded in catching the
lead, but in the final sprint for the tape
Callahan won.
