A. R. Kerr of A. R. Kerr & Co., dry goods merchant, died yesterday morning, after a short illness. The deceased was 60 years of age, and a native of New Brunswick, Canada. He came to Hamilton in 1862. He began business for himself in 1865, and was succeeded by his son, Mr. J. Kerr, in 1882. He was a member of the Hamilton and Westport Merchants' Association, and was one of the founders of the Hamilton Hotel. He was a man of high character and was highly respected in the community.

MORE MASSACRES ON CHRISTMAS

Swedish and Norwegian Missionaries Put to Death as Well as Native Christians.

CONVERTS BESIEGED BY BOXERS.

Under Authority of Chinese Officials Dec. 10 Placed on a Rising in Feking.

Pekin, Thursday, Dec. 6.—Captains Wingate and Ryder, who accompanied the expedition to Kalgan, returned yesterday. During their absence they visited several places to which the Germans did not go, but they encountered no opposition. They learned that some 12 Europeans, mostly Swedish and Norwegian missionaries, besides Captain Watta Jones, were massacred at Kwai Hsu Cheng by orders of the Taoist, and that 100 native Christians had also been put to death. The details of the outrages are most revolting.

Captains Wingate and Ryder visited the Belgian station, where the priests in charge and 300 soldiers, mostly Chinese, were besieged by Boxers and Imperial troops. They were informed that other stations further in the interior were being visited by Boxers, but by Chinese troops, acting under orders from the authorities, and in spite of assurances by the plenipotentiaries that the government is doing its utmost to suppress the movement.

The Chinese carrying concealed weapons are arrested. The details of the outrages are most revolting. The Dec. 10 has been fixed as the date for a rising against the foreigners in the capital. No other date is to be mentioned in all forms of Chinese art, ancient and modern.

Is St. Claude a Looter

Claude and Macdonald, former British Minister at Peking, and Lady Macdonald personally appeared before the Chinese Imperial Palace on Tuesday morning, and were carried off to the Imperial Palace to be confined there.
