WATER SERVICE CANNOT BE LEGALLY DISTURBED

Until After Full Trial in Autumn—King Edward Shows His Tact by Mackenzie Injunction Being Continued.

The injunction secured by William Mackenzie to restrain the city from cutting off the source of his water supply was yesterday continued by Chief Justice Meredith until the trial of the action.

Two grounds were stated as the basis of the decision. The first was that the city, by billing the plaintiff quarterly for water rates, entered into a contract with him. The other was that Mr. Mackenzie having acquired his property with the existing water supply, he could not be disturbed in his peaceful possession of the premises.

It was also held that the water supply was granted under the bylaw which provided that six months' notice of any withdrawal of the service should be given, and the council could not affect this contract by any subsequent amendment of the bylaw.

The case will probably be heard at the non-jury sittings in October, but as there is a long list of cases ahead of it, it may not be reached until late in the year.

MORE ATLAS LOAN JUDGMENTS.

McCrimmon Case to Be Heard July 18—A. E. Wallace's Examination.

The Master in Ordinary yesterday gave judgment against a number of shareholders in the Atlas Loan Co., who have entered no defence. They were A. C. Miller, Detroit, \$23,750; W. A. Griffin, Detroit, \$2,400; J. A. Griffin, Cincinnati, \$17,000; Miss Kate Goring, St. Thomas, \$300; Mrs. Minnie H. Hunt, St. Thomas, \$1,000; J. Vaden, Niagara Falls, \$300; Jessie Fraser, executrix of the estate of E. J. Fraser, Medicine Hat, N. W. T., \$3,200.

Nell Marple, of St. Thomas, who was accredited with stock to the value of \$2,800, offered \$400 in settlement, and the compromise was accepted.

The hearing of the case of Angus McCrimmon of St. Thomas was fixed for July 18 and A. E. Bastedo, court stenographer, was appointed to conduct the examination of A. E. Wallace on a date to be fixed. Mr. Wallace is at his home and confined to his room, where he submitted a vote of the people.

The amount involved in Mr. McCrimmon's case is \$25,000, and he denies that he subscribed for any shares not fully paid-up, saying that any entry showing unpaid shares was fraudulently made without his knowledge or consent. He also sets up numerous other legal grounds for resisting payment.
