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SECRET SESSION IN AUSTRALIA TO TAKE UP RECRUIT ISSUE

Commonwealth's Customs Receipts Have Dropped Ten Millions.

MELBOURNE, Australia, June 15.—(via Reuter's Ottawa agency).—The federal treasurer announced in the House of Representatives today that for the fiscal year ending 30th June, the revenue of the Commonwealth would amount to £32,500,000, and that despite the surplus of three million pounds carried over from the previous year the surplus of revenue over expenditure on June 30 would be only £127,000. The public debt, he said, amounted to £165,000,000, including war loans totalling £129,000,000. The treasurer said it would be inexpedient to deal with the estimates for the coming year, or to indicate imperative measures necessary for the energetic prosecution of the war. The position was very difficult. Customs receipts were expected to show a falling off of some ten million pounds owing to the shrinkage of imports. Premier Hughes expressed the hope that the House would assist the Government to formulate a scheme to secure sufficient recruits for the overseas forces. The Laborites objected to a secret session for this purpose.

Kaiser Tells Tino German Mailed Fist Will Restore Crown

"With Further Aid From Almighty God," Will Avenge Outrage.

BERNE, June 15, via London.—A telegram from Berlin says Emperor William has addressed the following message to one of the Greek diplomatic representatives abroad for transmission to former King Constantine: "I have heard with wrath of the infamous outrage committed by our common enemies upon you and upon your dynasty. I assure you that your deprivation can be only temporary. The mailed fist of Germany, with further aid from Almighty God, will restore you to your throne, of which no man by right can rob you. The armies of Germany and Germany's allies will wreak vengeance on those who have dared so insolently to lay their criminal hands on you. We hope to welcome you in Germany at the earliest opportunity. A thousand cordial greetings from 'FOUR WILLIAM'."

ONCE BITTEN, TWICE SHY

LONDON, June 15.—An admiralty communication was issued this evening concerning an allegation made in a German wireless dispatch charging inhumanity on the part of the British in failing to rescue more men of the crew of the German torpedo boat destroyer S-29, which was sunk by the British squadron in its attack on the German naval base at Ostend June 5. The communication explains that the British officer engaged in the rescue found that the S-29 had her torpedo tube trained on his vessel, while three enemy seaplanes were overhead, which apparently were about to drop bombs. It says also that the British rescuing vessel was under fire from the shore batteries, and that the officer therefore ceased rescuing the Germans when seven of them had been picked up, and no further could be done, and grave risks already had been incurred for the sake of humanity.

SOME OF BEST PLANS HAVE BLOWN UP, BUT VICTORY IS CERTAIN

Chairman of Inter-Allied Conference Speaks.

IS HOPEFUL OF RUSSIA

Now Looks to U. S. to Make Good Wastage in Man Power.

LONDON, June 15.—Henry Franklin-Bouillon, member of the French Chamber of Deputies, and chairman of the inter-allied parliamentary conferences, who is arranging inter-parliamentary conferences of the Allies for this fall, speaking at the American Luncheon Club today, urged the vital need of the closest possible co-operation between the Allies in what he hoped would be the final push of the war. In his address, M. Franklin-Bouillon said: "Although there is not the slightest doubt of the result of the war in our minds, we would be foolish to blind ourselves to the fact that we have got a long road to travel and must suffer much yet in the cause of final victory."

"It has been our misfortune that some of our best plans have miscarried, and we also have made some serious mistakes owing to the lack of co-operation and co-ordination. We must avoid such mistakes in the future. We must be prepared for the worst. We must be prepared for a situation in which we may not get all the assistance we expect from Russia, although everybody is still hoping that what is best in New Russia will prevail."

"With us in France it has begun to be largely a question of man-power. France already has sacrificed her manhood and our allies have incurred similar losses—the glorious English army of the battlefields of the Somme, the glorious Belgian army in Flanders, and the glorious Rumanian army, which battled hand-to-hand against the mailed fist. The same is true of wonderful Russia, which has lost three million men."

"Now we must look to the United States to make good the wastage and to work in close harmony with Britain, France, and the glorious nations who have borne the brunt of the fighting for almost three years."

GERMAN SPIES AT GIBRALTAR CAUSED LOSS OF U.S. SHIP

Captain of Barbara Tells of His Undoing on Reaching Home.

AN ATLANTIC PORT, June 15.—Capt. Frank Lauren of the American schooner Barbara, sunk by a German submarine May 24, while on a voyage from Port Arthur, Texas, for Spezia, reported on his arrival here today that spies at Gibraltar in some way had obtained information regarding the movements of his vessel and conveyed it to the commander of the U-boat by which he was attacked. One member of the crew was arrested at Gibraltar at Capt. Lauren's complaint and locked up. There was reason to believe, the captain said, that he had been in communication with German spies. It was known, he said, that the Barbara would proceed from Spezia to Gibraltar, and the member of the crew, whose name was not revealed, formally was charged by the Italian authorities with furnishing information to the enemy. While approximately 70 miles from Cape Trafalgar, Capt. Lauren was startled by a shell that whizzed over the masts of the Barbara and a moment later a submarine appeared close by. Mrs. Lauren, the captain's wife, got in a small boat with him and pulled up alongside the submarine and heard the German commander's orders for the crew to leave, as he was going to send the Barbara to the bottom. The men hardly had time to enter the boats before the submarine opened fire. The marksmanship was poor. After 27 shots had been fired, with the Barbara still afloat, the Germans went aboard and started firing for and aft. Capt. Lauren, his wife and crew had been adrift 24 hours when picked up by a Spanish brig and landed at Gibraltar.

SUBMARINE BREMEN IS ADMITTED LOST WITH RICH CARGO

LONDON, June 15.—(New York World dispatch).—The Nieuwe Nachrichten of Kiel, according to the Hague correspondent of the Daily Mail, at last admits the loss of the commercial submarine Bremen with its valuable cargo. The newspaper says: "The commercial submarine Bremen left Hamburg last August and since then, unfortunately, has been heard of no more. She carried a large parcel of American securities. The owners of part of these shares have applied to the railways in question and have asked for duplicate shares, on the ground that the Bremen had been lost with her whole cargo. 'The railway companies have made out fresh papers after the manner of the share owners of suitable guarantees.'"

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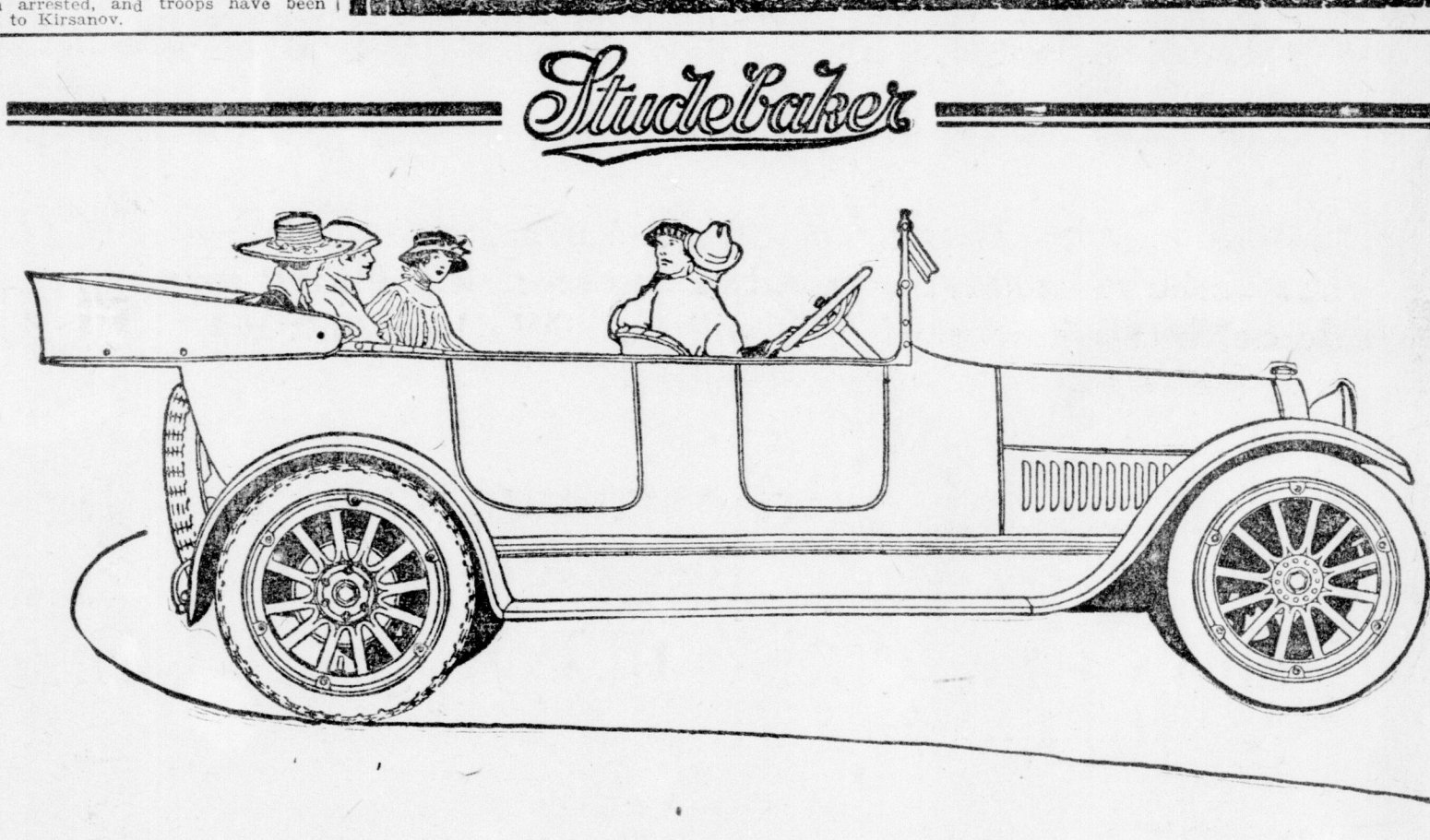
