WORK STARTED ON NEW CHURCH

Work was commenced yesterday on the new All Saints' Church on the Hamilton road. CANADIAN ACTUARY HONORED

By the Great Berlin Congress.—Mr. Macaulay of the Sun Life.

The fifth international congress of actuaries, which convened at Berlin on Sept. 10, and closed on Sept. 15, was one of the most largely attended of the congresses yet held. Some 600 delegates, representing 21 countries, were present. The sessions were held in the Chamber of the Reichstag or Imperial House of Commons. The Emperor, recognizing the importance of the gatherings, sent greetings. Every important country is entitled to a vice-president and secretary. The United States and Canada are in this connection considered as one, the actuaries of the two countries being internationally organized. To Canada has been given the honor of a voice in the administration of the congress, for Mr. T. B. Macaulay F.I.A., secretary and actuary of the Sun Life Assurance Company of Canada, was elected vice-president for the United States and Canada, and Mr. F. L. Hoffman, of the Prudential Insurance Company, of Newark, N. J., secretary. Dr. Hahn, of Magdeburg, is the new president, and Dr. Alfred Manes, of Berlin, the general secretary. Mr. F. B. Wyatt, F.I.A., of London, president of the Institute of Actuaries, is the vice-president for Great Britain.

Still Another Scheme.

The commissioners gave Engineer Moore orders to submit figures at the next meeting as to the cost of a 24-inch main from Komoka to London, and of another pumping station and dam below Kilworth.

It is the opinion of Commissioner Saunders that there is sufficient water between Springbank and Komoka to double the present supply, and furnish water for a city of 100,000 people. This would mean a supply of spring water for the next 25 years.

Consequently Mr. Saunders would like to have the figures for this new plant at Komoka. If this water was secured, he said, there would be no necessity for a river water plant.

In reply to a question, Mr. Moore stated last night that another hydraulic pumping station of 4,000,000 gallons capacity would cost about \$35,000.

The following list of what is demanded by the underwriters as ample fire protection for a city of 100,000 people, was produced by Mr. Moore:

One hundred gallons per day per capita.
Storage—A reservoir of five days' capacity, or 4,000,000.

Sixteen steamships, with pressure of 80 pounds at the hydrant, 50 pounds at the nozzle. This equals a discharge from each nozzle of 12,500 gallons per hour, or a total of 4,800,000 gallons per day.

Supply Mains—To commencement of general distribution to be in duplicate. Hydrants—Not to exceed 250 feet apart, in mercantile, and 500 feet apart in other built-up sections.

The city has at present a steam pumping capacity of 6,000,000 gallons per day—4,000,000 by one pump and 2,000,000 by another. So hydraulic pumps of 5,000,000 gallons capacity. The underwriters figure, however, that if anything went wrong with the 4,000-gallon pump when the hydraulics could not be used, the city would be in a bad position in case of a big fire, and they consequently ask that a larger supply of reserve water be kept.

Mr. Moore is also to furnish the commission with an estimate of the cost of a main from Komoka to Springbank, for the collection of the water of the city. It is claimed that all water between Kilworth and Springbank will gravitate to the present pump-house, and all water as far west as Komoka could be pumped by hydraulic pumps into the reservoir, or it could be pumped to Springbank and pumped to the city in the old main.

U. S. MEAT INSPECTION

Ruling That the Law Applies Only to Domestic Products.

Washington, Sept. 27.—A decision has been reached by the department of justice that the meat inspection law recently enacted by Congress does not apply to foreign meat products shipped into the United States.

The question was raised by importers of foreign meats and meat products. The department of agriculture held that the law applied to these products, and permitted inspectors of the department of agriculture to pass on them practically as they would pass on domestic meat products.

The question, however, was referred to the department of justice for opinion. The opinion was prepared several days ago, and submitted to Attorney-General Moody.

He concurred, it is understood, in the opinion prepared by the department.

HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY GRANTS

How the Societies Will Fare Under Provisions of the New Act.

Toronto, Sept. 27.—A statement has been completed by Mr. H. B. Cowan, provincial superintendent of horticultural societies, showing how the various horticultural societies of the Province are likely to be affected by the new act governing horticultural societies, which was passed at the recent session of the Ontario Legislature and which will come into effect the first of next year. This statement shows that, owing to the fact that the grant to horticultural societies has been increased by \$1,500, most of the societies in the Province will receive an increased grant. Only about ten societies will have their grants reduced to any considerable extent. These include the societies at Brantford, Cardinal, Stirling, Deseronto, Belleville, Napawan, Cobourg and Brantford. In each of these cases the society mentioned has been receiving larger grants in the past than most of the other societies in the Province, which accounts for the decrease in their grants.

All city societies, including those at Ottawa, London, Toronto and Hamilton, will have their grants greatly increased. The grant to the Toronto society will be increased \$183, making a total grant of \$323. The grant to the Ottawa society will be increased by \$254, making a total grant of \$904. The increase in the grant to the London society will amount to \$154, making a total grant to that society of \$294. Hamilton will benefit not quite as much as the others, their increase being just \$92, making a total grant of \$442. In the past the Toronto society has received a much smaller grant than the four other city societies.

A considerable number of the horticultural societies in the Province will receive a large increase in their grants. Those which will receive increases of \$25 and over and the amounts of the increases they will receive are as follows:

Walkerville \$25, Kincardine \$71, Chesley \$59, Windsor \$115, Durham \$29, Seaforth \$61, Smith's Falls \$59, Strathroy \$57, Woodstock \$45, Collingwood \$33, Collingwood \$34, Waterloo \$30, Clifford \$11, Tara \$27, Paisley \$55, Aylmer \$119, Goderich \$43, Owen Sound \$31, Lanark \$37, St. Catharines \$116, Tillsonburg \$61, Mitchell \$31, Barrie \$50, Lindsay \$26, Galt \$25, Guelph \$41.

The year the societies will receive their grants on the same basis as usual, as the new act does not come into force until next year.

GLENCOE'S FAIR WAS SUCCESSFUL

Weather None Too Favorable, But Attendance Was Good—Fine Display of Horses.

The 31st annual union fair of the Moss and Ekfrid Agricultural Associations was held on the 25th inst. at Glencoe. Unfortunately the weather was not all that could be desired, but notwithstanding this drawback a large crowd was in attendance.

Among the striking features of the exhibition was the horse show. All classes of horses were well represented. The heavier breeds were much in evidence, while carriage horses were below the standard in both quality and numbers. Mr. W. Edwards, of Toronto, officiated as judge of carriage horses. He was not apparently overly well pleased with the showing, and stated that in his opinion the farmers would find it decidedly more to their advantage to pay more attention to the breeding of the finer classes of horses, as they do not require any more work in connection with feeding and stabling, and when they are put on the market for sale they bring much better prices. He said that Western Ontario presents splendid opportunities for the breeding of such horses, and that even at the highest prices it is almost impossible to get enough horses of this class to fill the demand.

During the afternoon the newly-organized Glencoe band, under the leadership of Bandmaster Callahan, made its first appearance, and provided a splendid programme.

The exhibits in the main building, which were of fancy work, roots, vegetables, grain, fruit and flowers, were very good, and in many ways in advance of those of past years.

The poultry exhibit was a record-breaker in both quality and quantity. The sheep, swine and cattle were about the same as they have been for some time past.

A good programme of races was run off. One of the particularly good events was the race for lady drivers. Miss Tait, of Glencoe, won the honors for her town in a splendid drive.

Some close finishes took place in the 2:30 trot and pace. The farmers' race was also very closely contested.

POSEN IS LOYAL TO OLD POLAND

Children Refuse to Recite the Lord's Prayer in German as Ordered.

London, Sept. 27.—Growing excitement is reported from the German Province of Posen, owing to the rigorous application by the school authorities of a recent order issued by the Prussian Minister of Education and Culture, insisting on the employment of the German language at prayers and during religious instruction.

Recently the children of the elementary schools in several towns, including Posen, Gnesen, Gostyn and Siupl, openly defied their teachers when they were ordered to recite the Lord's Prayer in German. They declared that they could only pray in the Polish language. In some cases both boys and girls loudly sang the Lord's Prayer in Polish, when told to do so in German, and according to the local newspapers also ringed leaders were "brutally thrashed" for their disobedience. In other cases the teachers recognized that the children were acting in consonance with the advice of their parents, gave them a week to redress the matter, but the children have since unanimously declared that they are unable to pray in German. The movement has now spread to the higher schools, and several students have been expelled from the gymnasium at Gnesen for their refusal to use the German tongue in their religious exercises.

The Cologne Gazette publishes an article approving of the decision of the education authorities to exclude the youthful musicians by expulsion from all prospects of achieving higher education and embracing a liberal profession, and recommends further that extended use should be made of the punishment of detention after school hours in order to bring the scholars to a due sense of the merits of the German tongue.

Professor Hans Delbrueck, on the other hand, denounces the order the Minister of Education as a measure which places the German cause in the Polish province hopelessly in the wrong. It will, he says, furnish Polish agitators with one more effective weapon in the racial conflict. Speaking generally, Professor Delbrueck argues that Prince Bismarck's policy in the mixed provinces must now be admitted by its fruits as an egregious failure. If it is persisted in, he adds, Posen in the course of another generation will be completely Polishized, and there will be no Germans left in the province but officials and a few thousand peasant settlers.

Now the Prussian Minister of Education has sent to Posen a number of ministerial officials for the purpose of consulting with the local school authorities what steps shall be adopted to deal with the refusal of Polish children to say their prayers in German.

IMAGINES HE SLEW NELSON
Brooding Over Prizefight Made the Man Insane.

Cleveland, Sept. 27.—Brooding over the famous Gane-Nelson prize fight is said to have made Thomas Duckworth insane. He was arrested on a Cleveland street car. He terrorized passengers with the declaration that all the women were trying to shoot him.

When brought to the county jail Duckworth declared he had killed Battling Nelson the night before. "Yes, sir, I killed him," said Duckworth. "We fought to a finish, and that knockout I gave him certainly put my friend Nelson to sleep."

Duckworth said the woman whom he thought was pushing him with weapons were those who are opposed to prize fighting in general. In the suburban car he pleaded with several of his imagined adversaries not to hurt him.

Duckworth is small of stature, but thinks he is a giant. He says his size is what told against Nelson. He also says a dashing "uppercut" is what makes Nelson's funeral in order.

Early in the morning the man leaped through a window on Prospect avenue, near the Colonial Hotel. He was trying to flee from men, women and children whom he thought were after him with guns.
