Business Interests First.

A specific instance of "business interests first" on the part of Mr. Chappell, is cited in connection with the Chappell Coal Company of which Mr. Chappell is treasurer. A contract between the college and company for coal that he has sometimes wondered whether he or she was the head of the college. Mr. Chappell in turn indignantly protests that Dr. Sykes will have to get out for, if he continues as head of the college, it will be bankrupt, financially and advectionally.



Yet I should be glad for one if we could sent ten thousand men of our regular troops, so that the flag of the United States might at least be unfurled in the fields of France, I believe

that the mere sight of that flag in that region made so desolate by war, would stimulate the courage and help the success of those who have the same aim that we have, and who seek the same victory. We can also help the Allies, as the president recommends, with large credits and with those supplies which we can furnish and which they lack. We cannot do more in any direction to bring this war to a speedy end, than to give those credits and furnish those sup-

plies.' Should Selze Ships. Senator Ledge said one of the first acts of the United States should be to seize the German ships now in United States ports. and putting them in the world's 'We have never been a military

nation," Mr. Lodge continued. "We are not prepared for war in the modern sense, but we have vast resources and unbounded energies, and the day when war is declared we should devote ourselves to call-ing out these resources and organizing those energies so that they can be used with the utmost effect in hastening the complete victory.
"The worst of all wars is a feeble

war. War is too awful to be entered upon half heartedly. If we fight at all we must fight for all we are worth. It must be no weak, hesitating war. The most merciful war is that which most vigorously waged, and which comes quickly to an end."
