

VICTORY OF PEACE AND CHRISTIAN PRINCIPLES, THOUGHT OF MINISTERS SPEAKING IN CHURCHES ON SUNDAY

Christianity Has Overcome All Opposition in War, and World Looks Forward to Brighter Era—Some Anniversary Services.

For the first time in more than four years, church services were held yesterday without the accompaniment of the barking of the dogs of war. While in London the noise of war could not be actually heard, there was always the thought of the horrors of war disturbing the peace of the worshippers. One could not help noticing the vast difference between the Sunday of one week ago and yesterday. Then, every person, male, female and child, was waiting for the words that would announce a world of peace to come over the wires; yesterday every one rejoiced that at last right had triumphed over might, and the world could once more turn its attention to the pursuit of peaceful occupations. This old world that has been rocked by the roar of cannon for so long has been in the one week since the armistice terms were signed and the services in the local churches were in the nature of thanksgiving services.

Change Has Come.
"Some people thought the end of the war was coming through this war," said Rev. R. C. Tucker, D.D., of the First Methodist Church. "A certain portion of the world has passed away forever, and conditions will never be the same again. We have lived centuries during this last week."

"Humility must be the basis of all world reconstruction of the future; service the watchword, love the motive, and the welfare of the people the supreme law. Tyranny has been put down. We recognize the sovereignty of God over all things. The Kaiser sought to reverse the moral order and to prove the supremacy of might over right. Today Germany stands utterly discredited and the Kaiser is an outlaw from his own people. The retributive justice of God has been swift against him, and all who stood allied with him, and better future, and while joy is mixed with sorrow because of the 55,000 brave Canadians who gave their lives for the nation's gratitude will never forget their names."

Causes for Thanksgiving.
Rev. J. N. Tucker, M.A., D.C.L., at St. Paul's Cathedral during the morning service called attention to some of the causes for thanksgiving at this time. The heroism of the men who have shown by their sacrifice the true meaning of a place among the heroes of antiquity, and the devotion and willingness to give up their sons and husbands for the world from the menace of the submarine and the fact that the soldiers will

soon be home he also thought should be acknowledged by the citizens.
"We should show our thankfulness by our lives as well as our lips," he said. "The principles of brotherhood, justice and freedom for which our boys have been fighting should be applied to all of our peace efforts in London, justice between man and man, and brotherhood between class and class, so as to make the world a better place in which to live."

Liberty.
A just peace, victory for Christian ideals and liberty especially for the smaller nations were the three phases of the subject dealt with by Rev. W. R. Macintosh, in King Street Presbyterian Church. That liberty will be extended to social and industrial life and become universal was the hope expressed. Democracy has been well established and the reign of the common people has been upheld.

That God is anxious for the reign of peace and righteousness was the thought of Rev. Dr. D. E. Martin of St. Catharines based his sermon in Dundas Centre Methodist Church. "For four long years the world has been broken and its restoration by victory over militarism has been a new vindication of God and his righteousness, before all the world. Righteousness involves reconstruction in social, commercial, industrial and international relations. To carry out this world program two things are necessary, a real love for the people, such as Harold Begbie describes in his book, 'Twice Born Men.' We must have Christian courage to do what is necessary."

Principles Written Large.
"Through the war situation we find that Christian principles have been written large. Thousands of individuals have sacrificed their lives, millions of dollars have been spent, and the people have all given up their individual interests and pleasures to forward the work of the world. Rev. A. C. Bingham in Eberton Street Baptist Church on the subject of peace.

ANNIVERSARY SERVICES

At First Presbyterian.
Not for years have such happy anniversary services been held in the First Presbyterian Church as those of yesterday, owing to the fact that associated with them was thanksgiving for peace restored to the earth. Reference to the course of the war and success which has finally rested with the arms of the Allies figured prominently in both the morning and evening sermons of the anniversary preacher, Rev. J. H. Turnbull, M.A., D.C.L.

"The week shall inherit the earth," the text associated with the title "The Conqueror" for the forenoon sermon.

Drawing his illustrations from history, Mr. Turnbull emphasized the fact that Germany is not the first great nation which has known a great fall through attempting to dominate by might. The Jews, Assyrians, Romans had in turn become mighty in the earth, only to be conquered when they sought to dominate by might rather than to be guided by right.

The Iron Barriers.
The theme announced for the evening sermon, "The Iron Barriers," was interpreted as the barriers in the way of success which block the progress of individuals as well as nations. The mighty armies of the Hun proved a formidable barrier in the path of the Allies in achieving their objective—justice, liberty and enduring peace for the world. At times the barrier was so overpowering that no light penetrated. But the apparently unconquerable has been conquered, and after long, persistent and patient battering, the iron gate has suddenly crumbled.

The obvious lesson was that gates of iron cannot prevail against the individual, community or nation that has

a just cause, a stout heart and the patience to endure until victory is achieved.
At Wellington Street Methodist Church, assisted by the choir, a special music was rendered both morning and evening. The delivery of the morning service alone amounted to over \$500.

AT COLBORNE ST. METHODIST.
At the anniversary services held in the Colborne Street Methodist Church last evening by Rev. Dr. R. G. Pever, the church was beautifully decorated with the flags of all nations. Mr. Pever said that in the past four months the greatest change ever known to civilization had taken place. In the four months, plans had been made to evacuate the southern towns of England, as the war condition had got so bad that the hand of God had made the change and brought victory, and from now on there is to be a new world and conditions will never again be the same as they have been in the past, and it will be the welfare of the people that will be looked to after this. The choir was assisted by Miss Dorinda Abbott, Cornish, Fish, Harrison, and Miss Fisher. Rev. H. H. Bingham conducted the services in the morning.

AT CENTENNIAL METHODIST.
The Unifying Power of the Christian Religion was the subject of a sermon delivered last evening by Dr. E. R. Brailmont at the anniversary service of the Centennial Methodist Church. This was applied to the realm of religion itself, to the realm of the

individual and the practical, and also to the present world's situation. "Now that an attempt is being made to find a basis for a new peace, it will be found that the ideal of the Christian church, if properly applied, would be the strongest force in binding nations together and in promoting a world peace that shall be enduring, declared the speaker."

"It has too frequently been considered that one could only make progress at the expense of another and this is the selfish way. Each has tried to obtain the advantage over the other, and we are beginning to see that this is a radically false notion. Just as, in a proper business transaction, both buyer and seller may profit, so when two nations establish proper relations between each other, neither is worsted, but both benefited."

"This war has been teaching us to broaden our conceptions and we must hereafter attempt to think in world terms. There is a law which has been called the law of the world's good-will which is the good of each, working for the welfare of all. This law of good-will is the fulfillment of the supreme law of all nations. No nation sins alone or suffers alone."

The proposed league of nations can be successful in averting future wars, if its deliberations are founded on the basis of the Christian golden rule."

A service of praise under the direction of Bert Weir, organist, added to the evening service. The choir of 45 members sang, unaccompanied, the anthem by Sullivan, "Save Us, O Lord, from All Evil." The choir sang "Grant Us Thy Peace," by Henzelle. The solo parts in the latter being taken by Miss Gertrude Wood, Albert Ador and Charles Hall. A ladies' quartet, "Lead Kindly Light," by Bartlett, completed the musical part of the service. The collection taken at both services on Sunday amounted to over \$1,200.

DEATHS AND FUNERALS

G. F. BONNEY BURIED.
The funeral of George F. Bonney, who died in Victoria Hospital, from pneumonia, on Friday afternoon, took place on Sunday afternoon from the residence of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Bonney, 353 Ashland avenue, instead of from his late home, 17 Erie street, South London. The service was held at 2 o'clock, and was attended by Rev. A. C. Bingham, who officiated. The casket was borne by the family.

The service was conducted at the house at 1:30 o'clock by Rev. Leslie Arncliffe, St. James' Anglican Church, South London, a large number of friends gathering to pay their last respects.

During the service Miss Luta Layman sang "And God Shall Wipe Away All Tears." The pallbearers were Messrs. Morris, Cottle, Craig, Cunningham and Simpson. Among the many beautiful floral offerings was a large cross from the staff of Lavanian Jones, and a wreath from Erie avenue neighbors.

Among out of town members of the family who were present were Dr. and Mrs. S. F. Moore of Chicago, the latter sister of the deceased; Mrs. E. H. Weyburn, Sask., and the only surviving brother, Edward of Chicago.

Interment took place at Woodland Cemetery.

MILITARY FUNERAL.
A military funeral was held on Sunday afternoon, when William H. Moon, a member of the original Princess Patricia's Light Infantry, was laid to rest in the soldiers' plot in Mount Pleasant Cemetery. The funeral was under the auspices of the Great War Veterans' Association, and the pallbearers were six members from the association. The gun carriage was provided by headquarters. Playing the "Dead March in Saul," the Great War Veterans' Band headed the procession from the undertaker's parlors. He is survived by his wife, Daisy.

PETER PURVES DEAD.
The death of Peter Purves, husband of Louisa Purves of 115 Foreward avenue, occurred on Sunday at the family residence from pneumonia. He was in his 63rd year, and came to London recently from West Lorne, where he conducted a grocery store. He is survived by a family and his wife. The funeral will be held on Tuesday from the family residence at 2:30 o'clock. Interment will be made in Mount Pleasant Cemetery.

DESERTED FROM THREE ARMIES; GOES TO JAIL

Robert McPherson, who changed his clothes three times in four days, was sentenced in police court to not less than three months and not more than two years less one day in the Ontario Reformatory for stealing two suits of clothes and also for being a deserter from the Canadian army.

McPherson, a young Scotchman, who is without relatives in this country, deserted from the American army in November 5, crossed the river to Windsor from Detroit stole a suit of blue clothes and came on to London, promising to give himself up to the authorities here. He again stole a suit of clothes, shoes, and an overcoat, and was arrested by the local police. While in the Canadian army he was a member of the 21st Battalion.

VETERAN OF THREE WARS, DECORATED ON TWO OCCASIONS, DIES

Pte. W. J. Billington Succumbs To Pneumonia.

Pte. William J. Billington, one of the best-known and most popular members of the 33rd Battalion, died in the Military Hospital at an early hour on Sunday morning from pneumonia. He was an ex-soldier of the Imperial army, and had served in the Indian, Afghan and South African wars. He was the owner of two medals for gallantry displayed in both of these wars.

"Billy," as his friends called him, was a friend to everyone with whom he came in contact. When he first enlisted in the 33rd Battalion he was "B" Company storeman, and was promoted to the position of sergeant. When an opportunity came to go to France, he joined the Army Service Corps, and was promoted to Major. He was employed in the kitchen of his battalion.

When the 33rd Battalion formed its "Comrades Club," he became one of the active members. He was instrumental in obtaining the prizes for the picnic which they held last August. Pte. Billington was also a member of the O. W. V. A. Always of a cheery and congenial disposition, willing to do anything that would help others, he will be missed among a host of friends. He is survived by his wife and two sons. The funeral will be held on Tuesday from the family residence, 757 York street, at 2 o'clock. The service will be held at St. Mary's Church, where requiem high mass will be sung at 9 o'clock. Interment will be made in St. Peter's Cemetery.

CANADIANS MUST MAKE THEMSELVES WORTHY OF THOSE WHO HAVE DIED

Rev. W. M. Rochester Appeals for Consecrated Lives.

"The battle of Ypres, at which so many of our Canadian lads fought and laid down their lives that we might have liberty, surpassed the battle of Waterloo," said Rev. W. M. Rochester of Toronto, speaking in St. Andrew's Church on Sunday evening, in commenting on the gallantry of the Canadians. Never in the history of the world have we been given the opportunity to thank God for so great a victory, and never before has such a victory been won. We can tell the world who return home what we owe them, but to those who have gone before us, we are only able to pay a silent tribute which cannot be expressed. Now is the time for consecration and ready to mount. The only way we can repay the Lord for his goodness in this hour is by consecrating ourselves to the service of the world. We must meet the demands of reconstruction as the rock meets the wave."

At the morning service, Mr. Rochester spoke on the necessity of keeping Sunday hallowed, and said that if the Lord's Day Alliance act were suspended for any length of time, the Sabbath would be a thing of the past. "Now that the war is over, there should be no secular work on Sunday. Municipalities will no longer be required in the quantity they were during the war. Milk factories, which have been working on Sunday in order to keep the allied forces supplied, should discontinue Sunday manufacture also," declared Mr. Rochester.

The choir rendered special patriotic music under the direction of Charles E. Wheeler. The selection, "Land of Hope and Glory," was especially well rendered.

HERE'S A SNAG FOR PROPER ENFORCEMENT OF NEW MOTOR BYLAW

The new bylaw relative to automobiles being allowed to stand within 20 feet of a fire hydrant has caused a snag in the police court today and made Chief Williams and his crew look rather bewildered.

C. H. Wolfe was "pulled" for allowing his car to stand within 20 feet of a fire hydrant on the corner of Adelaide and Elizabeth streets Saturday. Thomas Coleridge appeared for Mr. Wolfe.

"This hydrant is on the line between Mr. Wolfe and his next door neighbor," said Mr. Coleridge. "The hydrant is properly in but 20 feet wide, how is he going to drive up to his place or business? The hydrant is within the 20-foot limit. Does the bylaw mean that a man can't drive up in front of his own place?"

"That's a feature that will have to be considered," replied Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon. "I won't impose any penalty today."

In the letter, Lieut. Sinclair says that he had "an awful crash" with several German machines on the morning that he was taken prisoner. During the fight, something went wrong with his machine, and he was forced to land a short distance behind the German trenches, but without any mishap whatever. For some time Lieut. Sinclair was listed as missing, but his parents were notified a few weeks later through the Geneva Red Cross, stating that he was a prisoner of war in Germany.

Brown declared that the public must be very patient with the returned men, and added that the "Y" had a large place to fill, in ministering to their social needs.
