

GERMAN BOLSHIEVSKI CAUSE SERIOUS DISORDERS IN BERLIN

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LOYD GEORGE PROMISES THAT EX-KAISER WILL BE PROSECUTED CANADA REGISTRATION ACT IS SUSPENDED

ALLIED FORCES WILL TEMPORARILY OCCUPY THE GERMAN CAPITAL

Police Supervision Will Be Exercised by Entente Soldiers in Berlin To Prevent a Recurrence of Recent Regrettable Incidents.

Copenhagen, Dec. 5.—Allied and American forces will temporarily occupy Berlin, as exercising police supervision, according to the Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung of Berlin, which says that an American wireless dispatch to this effect has been intercepted by the Germans. The newspaper says that Mannheim will be similarly occupied. The reason for this action on the part of the Allies is said to be a "regrettable incident during which a supervisor of a prisoners' camp shot three Frenchmen."

EARTHQUAKE OF SUCH VIOLENCE IS RECORDED ON SEISMOGRAPH THAT NEEDLES ARE DISLODGED

Shock Beginning at 3:48 o'clock This Morning Continues For One Hour—Disturbance Believed To Have Been in South America.

Washington D. C., Dec. 6.—An earthquake of great intensity, approximately 2,500 miles south of Washington, was recorded early today on the seismograph at the Georgetown University observatory. The shocks, beginning at 3:48

o'clock and continuing one hour, were so severe that at one minute after 4 o'clock the needles were dislodged from the machine. There was another sharp shock at 7:23 o'clock. It was thought at the observatory that the disturbance was in South America.

SHOCK IS RECORDED AT THE DOMINION OBSERVATORY

Ottawa, Dec. 6.—A severe earthquake was recorded at the Dominion observatory here this morning. The first preliminary tremors arrived at 3 hours, 47 minutes, 31 seconds, and continued for time, and the disturbance lasted for about an hour and a half. The distance to the epicentre is 3,600 kilometres, or 2,250 miles.

The shock was preceded by one of considerable less intensity, and from more distant source at a little before 3 o'clock, and was followed by another at 3:50 o'clock. The latter was possibly from the same source as the large one.

Ernest Hodgson, seismologist at the Dominion observatory, stated that the shock of the severe earthquake was great enough for the amplitude of the swing to be one and a half inches.

Officials at the Dominion observatory, commenting on the report of an earthquake recorded at Washington say the direction from which it came was probably inaccurately derived, and that in-

stead of being in South America it was the one felt in British Columbia.

FELT IN VICTORIA.
Victoria, B. C., Dec. 6.—A pronounced earthquake of several seconds' duration was felt here at 12:45 o'clock this morning. Houses shook and windows rattled all over the city. Island points in the immediate vicinity also reported noticing disturbance.

VANCOUVER SHAKEN.
Vancouver, B. C., Dec. 6.—The city was shaken violently by an earth tremor at 12:45 this morning. The tremor, which appeared to be from north to south, were felt for two minutes. A distinct rumbling was noticeable. Occupants of tall buildings were especially affected by the disturbance, many feeling seized with nausea. The shock was felt in all parts of the city, many persons being awakened by the rattling of furniture and rattling of dishes.

ALLIED COMMANDERS HAD INFORMATION ON ALL SUB MOVEMENTS

System of Intercepting German Code Located U-Boats.

London, Nov. 29.—Correspondence of the Associated Press.—Allied methods of gaining information about the movements of submarines during the war never will be divulged fully, but the accuracy of the daily reports has proved one of the surprising features of the war here. Very few submarines left their bases unknown to the allied fleet commanders. In addition, the numbers of the vessels, the duration of their cruises and the locality in which they were ordered to operate were known in nearly every case.

Such information usually was known within a day of the time the submarine left. It was transmitted to allied wireless stations, which had means of checking it up to a certain extent. Wireless operators at sea and ashore heard the submarine reporting in code to Germany every night, and their positions were learned as the code was being sent. This was done by means of a system of intercepting the wave length. This was done so accurately that the submarine could be definitely located as close as a mile, which is very close in the almost limitless expanse of the sea.

This assisted the allied anti-submarine patrols. They could keep the Germans on the move and by remaining in the waters they knew the whereabouts of the submarines, and did not waste time hunting where it was unlikely the prey was lurking.

NEW TRIAL DEMANDED FOR THOMAS MOONEY
New York, Dec. 6.—A new trial for Thomas J. Mooney, convicted of murder in connection with the preparation day parade bomb plot in San Francisco, was demanded in a resolution adopted last night at a meeting held under the auspices of the Central Federated Union to raise funds in his behalf.

LIBERAL UNIONISTS EXPECTED TO BREAK WITH GOVERNMENT

War-Time Elections Act Will Be an Issue.

MINISTRY IS TOTTERING

Liberals Who Went In For War May Come Back to Fold.

Ottawa, Dec. 6.—The Government is going ahead with the preparation of estimates for the coming session, but to the session itself it is looking forward with a marked degree of apprehension. One thing is certain—the date will be deferred just as long as possible for the ministry is frankly afraid to face a parliament in the absence of Sir Robert Borden and with Sir Thomas White, acting prime minister, and four or five other ministers waiting to act. At the present time Sir Robert's return is a question of uncertainty. There is no certainty in the first place, that he will secure a position at the peace table, and a desperate attempt is being made by the Government press to work up a clamor throughout the Dominion for the desired position.

Departed in Sullen Mood.
In the meantime the cabinet is at sixes and sevens with itself. Rumors of a big row over proposed reconstruction before the premier's departure are now beginning to leak out. It is said that insistence was laid upon the cabinet of the fifty-fifty agreement, but that the prime minister wanted to bring in some more Conservatives. As the consequence of this difference of opinion the premier departed in a sullen temper before anything was done. The situation, therefore, is in statu quo.

Meanwhile Liberal Unionists are commencing to wonder why under the circumstances they should continue to support a Government which has been tottering since 1914, from going the way of tottering offices. They joined for the period of the war and a "reasonable period" of reconstruction. They are beginning to think that "reasonable period" is about to expire, and that it is time to get back to their old allegiance. They believe that progressive reconstruction cannot be secured by a Government which represents the big interests.

Divisions Expected.
The session will not be far advanced before serious divisions are expected in the ranks of the Government and its present supporters. The question of the House before many of these divisions will be raised. On the one hand, the Liberal Unionists have no choice as to where they will stand. Then the war times measure certain Tories want to make an issue. They insist that the franchising provisions be continued. But many Liberal Unionists are alarmed at the prospect of the big interests.

QUEEN CITY COPS ARE NOT TO STRIKE

Toronto's Chief of Police Is Blamed For Present Unpleasant Position.

Toronto, Dec. 6.—Toronto will not be faced with a police strike. This was the decision arrived at by the members of the union early this morning. According to President Charles Scott, after hearing addresses by Mayor Church and others who advised consideration of the citizens at large it was decided to effect some amicable means of settlement between the men and the board of police commissioners. No mention was made of rescinding the charter from the trades and labor congress. It was stated that the men would form an internal organization. In view of the statement issued by the union this morning, it would seem as though further action in the matter of a strike has been definitely set aside for awhile at least.

Most of the men seem to think that in the light of recent events in the police department, an investigation into the affairs should be ordered. The men throw most of the blame on the chief and his ways of doing business.

WILSON URGED TO USE INFLUENCE TO BRING ON EARLY CONFERENCE

Prolongation of Present Situation Threatens Europe With Anarchy.
Bern, Thursday, Dec. 6.—President Wilson is urged to do his utmost to have the peace conference held at the earliest possible date, in a cablegram sent today to Washington by the Swiss committee for durable peace. REGISTRATION CARDS DO NOT HAVE TO BE CARRIED ANY LONGER, ACT IS SUSPENDED

It Is Neither God's Justice Nor Man's to Permit Ex-Kaiser And Others to go Unpunished Declares the British Premier

DISORDERS IN BERLIN CAUSED BY BOLSHIEVIKI

Considerable Firing in Streets of the German Capital.

London, Dec. 6.—Serious disorders have arisen in Berlin and considerable firing has occurred in the principal streets, according to reports reaching the Dutch-German frontier, says an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Amsterdam. The trouble is said to have been caused by the German Bolsheviki.

ONE-ELEVENTH OF CANADA'S EXPORTS WENT TO FRANCE

Great Britain and U. S. Are Only Better Customers of Dominion.

Montreal, Dec. 6.—Approximately one-eleventh of Canada's exports in the twelve months ended October 31 went to France, according to a summary of trade returns issued today. Next to Great Britain and the United States, France stands at the present time as the best customer of Canadian goods. The possibility of holding this trade will depend for the time being on Canada's willingness to establish credit for France here, until financial and commercial affairs are fully back on a peace basis. Normally, France is a producer of many commodities, for which there is a good market in Canada. But France's ability to supply these commodities in the war period has been dwindled, and relatively speaking, Canadian imports from France have become of huge proportions.

Lloyd George, in Re-statement of His Policy, Promises That Entire Influence of British Government Will Be Used To Bring To Justice Those Who Were Responsible For Causing War—Enemy Aliens To Be Expelled.

London, Dec. 5.—In the detailed re-statement of his policy issued by Premier Lloyd George today calling for the trial and punishment of the men responsible for the war, however high their places, he pledged the entire influence of the British Government at the peace conference to see that justice was done. In declaring for the expulsion of all enemy aliens from British soil, the premier pointed out that a considerable proportion of the residents in the United Kingdom during the war had abused British hospitality, and thus had forfeited their right to remain. In his statement the premier, after paying a warm tribute to the soldiers and sailors of the empire, said: "The Kaiser must be punished. The war was a crime. Who doubts that? It was a frightful, terrible crime. It was a crime in the way in which it was planned, and in the deliberate wantonness with which it was perpetrated. It was also a crime in the invasion of a helpless little state, and in the wicked and most brutal treatment of that little state, under the treaty of neutrality, the scrap of paper! "Surely, the war was a crime. The fact that all these iniquitous things were done in the name of war and under the imperious edict of an autocrat, does not change their nature. The war was a hideous, abominable crime, a crime which has sent millions of the best young men of Europe to death and mutilation, and has plunged myriads of homes into desolation. "Is no one responsible? Is no one to be held responsible? Surely, that is neither God's justice nor man's. The men responsible for the making of this war must be held responsible for the human race must not be left to believe that their heads were crowned when they perpetrated the crime. "The British Government referred the question of the criminal culpability of the Kaiser and his accomplices to their law officers some weeks ago. They invited a body of jurists in England to investigate the matter, and they have unanimously come to the conclusion that the Kaiser and his accomplices are guilty of the crime of this war. They also reported strongly in favor of the punishment of such persons. "The British Government will use its whole influence at the peace conference to see that justice is executed. Would Exile Aliens. "After four or five years it is impossible to entertain in our midst a population of which a considerable portion abused British hospitality. They spied and plotted and assisted Germany in forming plans for the destruction of a country which of have forfeited any claim to remain. "Further, it would lead to inevitable irritation and disturbance if Germans who have been fighting us for four years came here to take the bread of the months of the men whom they for four years sought to destroy, and as much as I regret that it is impossible to have free intercourse between the events of the last four years, for which Germany alone is responsible. All the European allies have accepted the principle. Central powers must pay the cost of the war to the limit of their capacity. "In one passage of his program, that dealing with measures for an increased of British output, Mr. Lloyd George says: "There is one condition for the success of all efforts to increase the output of the country, namely, confidence. Bolshevism is the poison of confidence. Russia proves that. Russia will not permit the building up of a productive system until Bolshevism has worked itself out."

CONFIDENCE NEEDED TO INSURE SUCCESS, SAYS LLOYD GEORGE.

London, Dec. 6.—(Canadian Press via Reuters.)—Lloyd George, in his statement of his policy for increasing the output of the country, said that confidence was needed for success, and that those who must give confidence to the world were the British. He said: "I say to labor: you shall have justice. You shall have a fair share of the amenities of the war. Your children shall have equal opportunities with the children of the rich. To capital I say: you shall not be oppressed and penalized. Do your duty to the world, and you shall have a future free for all the enterprise of the world. There is no justice in the future must be equal justice. But there is no happiness in its heart. We will tolerate no sweating, and labor must have its just reward."

RUSSIAN RED GUARDS CONTINUE TO SLAUGHTER POPULATION OF PETROGRAD; THOUSANDS STARVE

Fugitives From Stricken City State That Conditions There Are Beyond Imagination—Only 500,000 Left Out of Normal Population of 2,000,000.

Stockholm, Thursday, Dec. 6.—(By the Associated Press.)—Fugitives from Russia who have reached here say that life in Petrograd is terrible. The famine, they say, defies the imagination. There is selling for 50 rubles and butter and sugar for 150 rubles per kilogram (2.2 pounds). Herring are the only food obtainable and sell for 5 rubles each. All middle-class elements are excluded from public eating houses and are dying of starvation by thousands. Hundreds are buried each day between 5 and 9 o'clock in the morning, no funerals being permitted later during the day. Of a normal population of 2,000,000, only 500,000 is left in Petrograd. The city looks deserted. Half of all the flats are occupied by red guards and their families. Hotels, restaurants, cafes and offices are closed. The houses of the middle classes are deserted. Many widely-known persons have been shot or have starved to death recently. Rumors of approaching Entente intervention have increased frenzied persecution of the middle-class elements. There is great nervousness in the news. The Polish legation has been looted while the Swiss legation has been entered forcibly. The personnel of this legation has left Petrograd.

TAMMANY LEADER IS MADE CO-DEFENDANT IN \$10,000,000 DAMAGE SUIT

Manufacturer Alleges That Murphy Tried To Ruin Him.

New York, Dec. 6.—Charles F. Murphy, leader of Tammany Hall, was made co-defendant in a suit for \$10,000,000 damages brought in the supreme court by Louis Hartog, a manufacturer of meat products, against the Corn Products Refining Company and others for alleged breach of contract. The complaint states that Mr. Murphy possessed and exercised as leader of Tammany Hall "great political influence—power and authority" and with the other defendants "conspired to ruin the plaintiff."

NORMAL SERVICE RESUMED.

Cleveland, Dec. 6.—Normal street car service in this city was resumed at 5 o'clock this morning, after a complete stoppage since 5 o'clock Tuesday morning.

Natives of German Colonies Desire To Come Under British

Wishes of People of Conquered Domains.

London, Dec. 6.—Natives of Germany's colonies desire to come under British rule, said Walter Hume Long, secretary of state for the colonies, speaking at Westminster last night. "Our representatives at the peace conference should see that the case for our retention of those colonies is put forward in full strength. It will be a gross injustice to our great dominions to sell them. These colonies which are a large measure of their conquest by their blood and valor, are to pass under the control of anybody but the empire to which they belong."
