CITY DENTISTS TO INSPECT CHILDREN FREE OF CHARGE

In accordance with the instructions of the department of education that all school children in Ontario shall undergo a dental inspection, the educational authorities in the city and county will see that the work is started immediately. For some years there has been dental inspection in the schools and as in the past the school dentist, Dr. E. M. Fuller, will be in charge of the work in the city.

Local dentists have offered their services free of charge to the county board. Each one will be allotted a district, and it is expected that they soon will begin inspection.

THOMAS LANGFORD, 89, EARLY PIONEER IN TP. OF LONDON, IS BURIED

The funeral of the late Thomas Langford took place Thursday afternoon at two o'clock, from his residence on the fifteenth concession and graded side road, London Township. Mr. Langford died in his 89th year. He was a pioneer of the early days. He had recalled the times when the prowling of wolves necessitated the burning of large fires on the old homestead, where he was born, his entire life he had watched London grow from a bush to the present populous city.

The deceased was active in municipal politics for years in Middlesex and London Township councils. Up to the end he manifested a keen interest in politics. The fear that he might not live till the 20th to see the prohibitionists win the fight, had caused him much anxiety.

The funeral was held under the auspices of the Edgewood L. O. L., No. 890, of which he was a past master and member from early manhood. A long stream of cabs and cars followed him to his last resting place, bearing testimony to the venerable esteem in which he was held. The services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Jefferson of Granton.

The pall-bearers were Nelson, Ernest, Hedley and Albert Langford, Uriah McRoberts and Douglas Westman. He is survived by one sister, Mrs. Martha McRoberts, one son, T. Westman, and seven daughters, Mrs. J. McRoberts, Mrs. Geo. R. Rowell, Mrs. John Grose, London, Mrs. John Walls of Sault Ste. Marie and Misses Bella and Alberta at home.

KNOLLWOOD PARK'S NEW PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH ALL READY

Official Opening Set For Sunday Next.

INTERESTING HISTORY

Congregation Has Worked Under Difficulties For Many Years.

The official opening of the Knollwood Park Presbyterian Church will take place on Sunday next, when the congregation, which for many years has been working under great disadvantages in a temporary frame building, will move over into the new red brick church, situated on the corner of Oxford and Quebec streets.

The history of this little church, like that of many of the churches growing up in the outlying districts of the city, is a most interesting one. In 1907 the need for a Sunday school was greatly felt in the Knollwood Park district, no other school being within walking distance for the children. There was no building suitable to be had, and that did not stop the energetic Presbyterians here, and soon a small Sunday school was started in the shipping-room of Gammage's greenhouse. The principal workers at this time were three young men, A. Gmond, J. Innie and George Miller, and for a year a successful Sunday school was carried on in this room.

Temporary Church. The attendance at the school, however, grew rapidly, and the need for a church building also was felt, so in December, 1908, a temporary frame building was moved into that part of the city and opened as a Presbyterian Church. Great assistance was given this church from time to time by St. Andrew's and New St. James's Presbyterian Churches, Rev. T. H. Mitchell especially taking a paternal interest in the church.

After the frame church had been acquired, for a time services were held after Sunday school, each Sunday afternoon, local ministers assisting sometimes, and sometimes took the form of a prayer meeting led by one of the members of the congregation. Finally Rev. P. A. Nichol was appointed first minister to the church, and regular services were held every Sunday night and morning.

Rev. P. Nichol was followed by Rev. J. Jamieson, Rev. A. H. Drumm, Rev. A. Webster and the present minister, Rev. John Currie.

A Fine Edifice. In the winter of 1917 Rev. A. H. Drumm brought the matter of better accommodation at Knollwood before the Presbytery of Ottawa, and as the result that it was decided to build the present \$3,500 building, the money being raised by subscription in Knollwood Park and various Presbyterian congregations in the city. And last fall the foundation stone was laid by A. E. Silverwood.

The building to be opened on Sunday next has a seating capacity of 150, and the average attendance of the school being 110. So that, with the present minister, Rev. John Currie, one of the veteran workers in the Presbyterian Church, this little church is now in an excellent condition to expand rapidly.

DUNDAS CENTRE CHOR ON VISIT TO INGERSOLL

The Dundas Centre Methodist Church choir motored to Ingersoll last evening to fill a concert engagement in the in the inclement weather. In spite of the enthusiastic audience had gathered to witness the choir on this, their third visit to Ingersoll.

Special numbers were, solos by Miss Handford of Ingersoll, who is "assessed" of a rich contralto voice of rare quality, and J. Parnell Morris, who delighted his audience with his rendering of the impressive number, "Christ in the Garden," by request.

At the close of the program refreshments were served to the choir and friends by the Young Ladies' Mission Circle of the Ingersoll Methodist Church, under whose auspices the concert was held.

Others come into court as if they were being brought up on a murder charge.

For the first time in many months a lawyer appeared in behalf of a violator of the motor vehicle act. W. Brenner was charged with having traversed the distance between Ontario and Rectory White and P. Morris.

Mr. Brenner's chauffeur stated that he was not looking at the speedometer at the time, but that instinct told him that he was not exceeding the speed limit. ALL ARRANGEMENTS TO FEED VETERANS FULLY COMPLETED

Women's Organizations Prepare For Prince's Visit.

Final arrangements for the feeding of the returned men from Western Ontario on Thursday next during the prince's visit were made at a meeting of representatives of the various women's organizations in the city, held yesterday afternoon in the G. W. V. A. rooms. As soldier visitors up to the number of six or ten thousand are expected, the task of feeding them, even by the simple methods of preparing box lunches, has been no light one.

Edwards as convener, have completed arrangements, and a sufficient number of boxes have been promised by the various women's organizations in the city. The committee will call upon the Red Cross Association for a donation of the coffee, cream and sugar to be used on that occasion. "And they have a request," said one of the women in charge.

Early Thursday morning a committee of soldiers will call for the boxes which have been filled at various points throughout the city, and deliver them at the heights, where they will be artistically arranged in piles on the long tables, which, together with cups of steaming hot coffee, will complete the lunch served. Small souvenir badges of royal purple will be distributed to the men by the women's committee.

ALL VOTES GO INTO ONE BOX IN COUNTY POLLING STATIONS

Referendum Committee Wants Precautions Taken.

WOULD SEPARATE THEM

Then Reseal Liquor Votes in Presence of Scrutineers Until Counting Time.

A new point in connection with the coming provincial and referendum elections has been raised by the local branch of the Ontario referendum committee, concerning the work of the scrutineers after all of the votes have been collected in the ballot boxes. In the county polling stations, the votes for both of the elections are to be dropped into the same boxes, to be sorted later by the scrutineers. The precaution advised by the O. R. C. is that the referendum votes should be placed in separate boxes and sealed, if the referendum scrutineers have to leave the room during the counting of the first—the provincial—election votes. In the city, a different procedure will be followed; the votes will be dropped into separate ballot boxes. The local organization of the Ontario referendum committee is reported to be in excellent shape and the members are confident of victory. For several weeks they have been working hard for success, their day extending from early morning until the small hours of the following morning.

K. OF C. HUTS WILL CONTINUE TO WORK AMONG EX-SOLDIERS

Have Provided Bed and Meals for Thousands.

Although the K. of C.'s army hut which was located in St. Peter's Parish Hall is closed, distribution of comforts will still be continued throughout the five military hospitals in this city through the office in that building.

Further work is to be carried on among the returned men of this city by the Knights of Columbus after a session is reached and a plan drawn up by the committee appointed by the Government to report on the question of re-establishment and further gratuity to returned soldiers.

E. V. Hession, secretary of the organization, summed up the work accomplished by the hut while in existence. He said that the purpose of it was to aid in the re-establishment of soldiers into civil life.

Every troop train coming into the city was met by a representative. Some nights as high as 200 men were given beds, baths and breakfast next morning free of charge. No charge was made for anything the first day, but after the first day, 25 cents was the charge for a bed and each meal. Shower-baths, billiard tables, check-rooms, use of the safe for depositing valuables, reading and writing rooms and entertainments were supplied free at all times.

During the existence of the hut 6,500 beds and 23,572 meals were supplied, mostly free of charge. Close harmony prevailed with other organizations in the city, and much of the success was due to the ladies, both Catholic and Protestant, co-operating in work on the men.
