"The lack of skilled men among the younger workers presents," said Mr. Dennis, "the great problem. It has been brought about to a great extent by the abolition of the old system of apprenticeship. At the present time the young men come from school and either seek a 'white shirt' job, or become machine hands, handy men or laborers. The best human material in the world is to be found in Canada but I doubt if the employers, fathers and teachers are discharging their responsibilities toward the boy in a proper manner."

Use of Pyrometer.
