VETERANS TO DISCUSS MEMORIAL FUND AT TONIGHT'S MEETING

Question of Gratuity For Sanatorium Patients Also Coming Up.

One of the important matters to be discussed at the reorganization meeting of the G. W. V. A. this evening will be that of the memorial fund. Several women's organizations of the city are of the opinion that the funds should go in aid of a hospital for the children of the soldiers who were killed in the war, while others claim the G. W. V. A. should have the money. This will be decided upon this evening.

The gratuity money of the patients of the sanatorium will be another important matter to be taken up. Some of the patients have not received their gratuity and in one case a man has \$500 coming to him. One of the men who was in the sanatorium for several months stated to The Advertiser that he bought a house from a patient last week for \$1,800. Before the house was sold the owner had the whole sum borrowed, and was paying six per cent interest.

"If that man's gratuity was not tied up, he wouldn't have to pay the interest, as I think he has the remainder of the money," he said.

Two resolutions will be brought up, but the officers would like the remainder of the money, as some developments are expected to follow.

ACCIDENTS ON BOTH LINES MONDAY NIGHT

Springbank Cars As Well As L. and P. S. R. Are Delayed.

Both the London and Port Stanley Railway and the Springbank street car line suffered delays in the service owing to accidents to the lines on Monday night.

On the L. and P. S. R. an engine and a number of cars jumped the track at a switch in St. Thomas, that traffic was suspended for an hour.

Near Woodland Cemetery the street car wires were cut, causing delay for a similar period of time. The accident happened late at night, so that many who had been waiting for the cars did not reach the city until after midnight. Some of the cars on the city lines going to the home of every passenger served as a means of transportation for persons going east.

Although there was no definite cause of the break given, it is claimed that a trolley on a city-bound car lost contact with the main wire and cut some of the cross-wires.

PROTESTING AGAINST TAKING CONCERT FEES

Protest against the fees charged for use of the city parks for land concerts has been forwarded to City Clerk Baker by Mrs. R. H. Heard, convenor of the I. O. D. E. concert committee. She stated that the public utilities commission is charging 20 per cent of the proceeds from each concert. She thinks this is unjust, as the proceeds are for charitable purposes. The concerts will be continued, however.

The question was raised some time ago at a meeting of the public utilities commission. It was contended that some charge should be made for the use of the park, because the park had to be cleared up on the day following each concert.

BANDSMEN IN DISPUTE RE NON-UNION MEN

A dispute between union and non-union bandmen of the city is creating quite a stir amongst the soldiers. At a meeting of the bandmen of the city held Monday it is claimed that it appeared that the G. W. V. A. band would have to stand by the non-union ones.

Some of the men claim that the officers of the city are the ones who are causing the trouble, while others cannot trace the source. The main trouble is that men living out of town are not allowed to play with the soldier organizations which are giving concerts in Victoria and Queen's parks.

No information regarding the meeting was allowed to be made public, although it is intimated that a line of action has been decided upon that will be productive of a satisfactory adjustment among the men.

FAVORS MINIMUM CHARGE FOR GAS

Ald. Moorhead Has Plan For Solving the Problem.

A minimum charge for gas was suggested by Ald. C. G. Moorhead today as a means of dealing with the present situation. He thinks the commodity could be placed on the same basis as the city water. A minimum charge could be fixed at 90 cents a thousand feet. This amount would be paid by anyone using that amount or less. After exceeding a thousand feet, the consumer would pay accordingly. Besides increasing the company's revenue, this would also have the effect of curtailing the supply, as most consumers would endeavor to keep below the minimum amount, he thinks.

While not criticizing the report made by City Auditors Dale and Searson, Mr. Moorhead thinks that it should have shown the capital stock of the company and whether the original amount has been increased out of the earnings.

"If the people have paid out of their pockets for the expansion of the company, then they should not have to pay an increased price for gas now that the company is losing a little," he said. "On the other hand, if it is found that the stock has not been increased out of earnings, then the company certainly needs help. So far as I can learn, though, the city council has no jurisdiction in the matter."

Williams, recently resigned from office.

Inspector Robert Birrell, who is after the job, is performing the duties of acting chief at present, and the commissioners state that with this difficulty overcome there is no immediate rush for the appointment of an officer to fill the vacancy. The four candidates for the post are also observing strict silence, making it as it were until the commissioners meet to consider their applications.

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WON'T STAND FOR IT UNLESS JUSTIFIED, SAYS H. B. ASHPLANT.

"I anticipate that labor won't stand for any increase in the price of gas unless complete justification is shown for it," said H. B. Ashplant, a member of the labor representation committee, today. "Labor is not satisfied by any means that the report which was submitted by the city auditors proves that an increase is necessary. It shows a loss up to date. If there is a loss in slack months that is no indication of slack months for a whole year. While it is true that operating costs are high it does not necessarily follow that a higher price for gas is necessary."

"The past records of the company show that it has been a very profitable undertaking. Large surplus earnings have been re-invested. Bonds could easily be issued on this, and the money used to meet current expenses. If this is the situation, then would be the time for the people to come to the rescue."

"Labor is not opposed to a proper and legitimate return for legitimately invested capital, but it is opposed to the compounding earnings and re-investing in the company's surplus revenue which is really taken out of the consumers."

Mr. Ashplant could not state what steps the labor representation committee would take in event of the change being made, but he claimed that it was within the right of any citizen to issue an injunction to prevent such a proceeding.

ANOTHER BAND MAY BE FORMED LOCALLY

One Way Out of the Trouble Over Ruling of Union.

Definite word is expected any time from Joseph N. Weber, president of the Musicians' Union of the International Federation of Labor, New York, regarding the non-union bandmen in the city wishing to play in soldier organizations bands. The dispute is over some of the men of the P. P. C. L. I., who hold out-of-town union cards, not being allowed to play in the city bands. The spirit of the local bands are willing to have the men from the P. P. C. L. I. form a band, but it is contrary to the rules to have any meet play with a union man who has not a local union card.

There are ten men of the P. P. C. L. I. affected by this ruling, and when satisfactory word is received it is thought likely that another band will be formed in the city. If one cannot be formed, the men will in all probability be taken into the other soldier bands.

FIGHT TO A FINISH OVER GAS QUESTION

The foreign minister of Germany has increased the tonnage of coal from 1,100,000 tons to 1,400,000 tons within six months, and to 1,700,000 tons within a year. This could only be done, he said, if the Allies made better food conditions possible for the miners and the coal trade.

The premiers after prolonged discussions with the Germans in a calm, business-like manner, informed Chancellor Fehrenbach and Dr. Simons that the Allies must have their final answer tomorrow.

If the German reply was rejection, the Allies would be declared, would take measures to enforce their demands, either by occupation or by sending their own commission into Germany to examine the situation in the mines.

The ultimatum was delivered in the quietest tone by the Belgian premier, Mr. Dierckx, at the meeting dissolved.

The British prime minister said to Dr. Simons: "Think this over and come to terms."

OFFER COMPROMISE.

PARIS, July 12.—In German circles last evening the belief was expressed that tomorrow the Allies would offer the German 1,800,000 tons of coal monthly, says the dispatch.

ASKED POSTPONEMENT.

PARIS, July 12.—When the allied offer to accept two million tons of coal monthly, together with a promise to facilitate the feeding of the miners was not accepted, says a Havas dispatch, the French government declared that it would revert to the reparations commission's figures of 2,400,000 tons.

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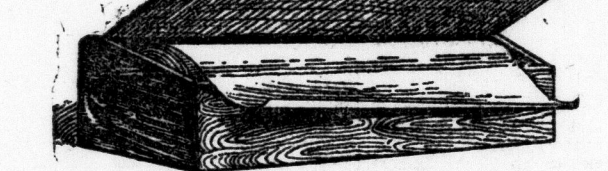
