Ald. Moorhead Has Plan For Solving the Problem.

A minimum charge for gas was suggested by Ald. C. G. Moorhead today as a means of dealing with the present situation. He thinks the commodity could be placed on the same basis as the city water. A minimum charge could be fixed at 90 cents a thousand feet. This amount would be paid by anyone using that amount or less. Afanyone using that amount or less. After exceeding a thousand feet, the consumer would pay accordingly. Besides increasing the company's revenue, this would also have the effect of conserving the supply, as most consumers would endeavor to keep below the minimum amount, he thinks.


