

Rickard the Master Mind.

This article is going to give a closeup of Tex Rickard, the master mind of
the trust. Rickard is an adventurer,
but an adventurer who always thinks
of big things. That is why he nas accomplished big things in the boxing
line.

Tex began life as a Texas cowboy. It is related of him that he never packed is related of him that he never packed a gun, contrary to reports generally current, but nevertheless whenever he "started anything" the other guests jumped out of the windows. From Texas he drifted to Montana, and when civilization followed him he took the great jump into the Northwest to find what he could stir up in the Arctic region.

In the first great Alaskan gold rush Tex was among those who broke the first trail along the Yukon. In that district he got quite a little reputation about the gaming tables, but he kest practically as much as he won.

There was one thing that men learned about Rickard at that time, however, he never broke his word. He never has. This trait has proved invaluable to him in creating the great boxing trust.

Career as Promoter.

When Goldfield wanted to get fame, a citizens' committee turned the job over to Tex. He arranged a battle between Joe Gans and Battling Nelson, offering a purse of \$30,000, a record for lightweight fights, together with \$4,000
