"LORD DEVONSHIRE" WILL BE BROUGHT TO TORONTO

Under Arrest in Detroit Charged
With Theft of Jewelry and
Bank Book.

DETROIT, Jan. 24.—George T. Woodman, alias Lord Devonshire, who on Tuesday evening last married a woman of this city, and on Wednesday was arrested on suspicion of being back to Toronto to answer the charge of stealing \$200 worth of jewelry and a bank book.

The arrest of Woodman resulted from a tip that Siegel, the Woodward-avenue merchant, gave the police several days ago. Woodman called at Siegel's store and purchased goods valued at between \$300 and \$400 for his bride-to-be. Woodman, instead of paying for the goods, offered a cheque and a Toronto bank book. Mr. Siegel kept the bank book and wired to Toronto to find out whether Woodman had passed the cheque. The Toronto bank replied that the cheque was good. An answer was returned saying that Woodman was unknown. The police investigated and Woodman's arrest followed. He will be returned to Toronto this week.

SICK OF THE ATLANTIC, Mount Royal Passengers Overdue on Another Boat.

ST. JOHN, N.B., Jan. 24.—The three hundred continental emigrants, men, women and children, who early in December sailed from Antwerp for Canada, are certainly having enough of the North Atlantic to last them for a lifetime. They took passage on the Mount Royal on Dec. 7, and after being driven all over the ocean for 32 days were finally returned to Queenstown.

There, on Jan. 11, they once more embarked on the steamer Montrose on the voyage to St. John. The Montrose should make the trip in ten days, and was due here on Tuesday last, but up to the present there has been no report from her. She is now three days overdue, and while, of course, there is not the slightest anxiety, such delays being the rule rather than the exception at this season, there is general sympathy for the foreigners on board, who are finding such difficulties in their endeavor to reach Canada.

LOCAL OPTION BYLAW QUASHED IN SALT FLEET

Judge Snider Will Issue Certificate This Morning—General News of a Busy City.

HAMILTON, Jan. 24.—(Special.)—Judge Snider decided this afternoon to quash the local option bylaw in Saltfleet Township and will issue a certificate to that effect in the morning. The bylaw, according to the returns given out at the time of the election, had a majority of four over the sixty per cent. required. The recount did not make a material change, but George S. Lynch-Staunton, K.C., who appeared for those opposed to the bylaw, set up the contention that the deputy returning officers and poll clerks had no right to vote.

It was shown that nine of these officials did vote, and also J. Robertson, who had moved out of the riding. His honor held that these ten had no right to vote, and this converted the majority into a minority, the law assuming that all rejected votes were cast in favor of the bylaw. The temperance people will likely appeal, contending that the judge had no right to hold a scrutiny into the voters' list.

Recount in Saltfleet.
At Stony Creek this morning Judge Snider opened the recount of the ballots cast in Saltfleet on the local option bylaw. The counting of the ballots resulted in a gain of one for the bylaw, and a reduction of one against the bylaw, making the correct count: For bylaw, 487; against, 521. Evidence and argument as to the legality of some of the ballots was heard this afternoon. If those opposed to the bylaw can get four ballots thrown out the measure will be quashed.

It is rumored that William Armstrong will probably be appointed to succeed the late E. A. Dalley as license commissioner. City Engineer Barrow has recommended a number of changes and a shakeup amongst the officials of his department. He would like to see the streets placed under the control of one committee, and it is understood that if the change is made the following will be the officials in charge: City engineer and manager of the waterworks, E. G. Barrow; assistant engineer, J. R. Heddle; street commissioner, Y. C. Brennan; accountant, A. T. James; superintendent of waterworks, Albert Anstey.

Rene Wilson has bought the race-horse Matson for \$5.

It is likely the police commissioners will have a meeting this month, but it is doubtful if the proposed promotion will be made then. To-day at noon it was arranged that Mayor Stewart, John Billings, chairman of the hospital board, and Miss Lewis were to be the trustees of the Sick Children's Hospital, and they will have power to turn the funds over to any other charitable purpose if enough to build the institution is not raised.

Bert Hardy was arrested at the local postoffice this morning on the charge of stealing a postoffice savings bank pass-book from Thomas Carrington, Port Credit. It is alleged that by means of the book he drew \$50 through the Port Credit branch of the postoffice in Toronto.

ANGELICAN COMMITTEE IN LAYMEN MOVEMENT

Frank Hodgins, K.C., Named as Chairman—Will Raise \$150,000 for Missions.

The laymen of the Church of England will endeavor to do their part in the Laymen's Missionary Movement by raising \$150,000 for missions during the present year. This sum will be contributed thru the regular channels of giving. The decision was arrived at at a very representative meeting in the schoolhouse of the Church of the Redeemer last night and embodied in the following resolution: "Be it resolved that the laymen of the Church of England present at this meeting and representing all the parishes of the Church of England in the City of Toronto, are of the opinion that the Church of England should endeavor to raise \$150,000 and do pledge themselves to do all in their power to see that this amount is realized."

"And be it further resolved, for the purpose of furthering the object of the Laymen's Missionary Movement in the Church of England a central committee of laymen be now appointed with power to do all in their power to see that this amount is realized."

The meeting was presided over by His Grace, Archbishop Sweetman, and the movement was explained by Hon. S. H. Blake and N. F. Davidson. The resolution was submitted by Noel Marshall and seconded by R. H. Coleman.

The Situation in China.
"You cannot conceive of an opportunity such as we have to-day," declared Rev. Dr. Mackay in an address on missionary work in China to a meeting in the Bloor-street Presbyterian church last night. The meeting was held under the auspices of the Presbyterian Laymen's Missionary Movement.

"China is likely soon to follow in the steps of Japan," said Dr. Mackay. "If we are going to use our influence in China we must do so speedily."

"My eyes are turned to a country so beautiful as China. It has not the beauty and varied landscape of a mountain country, but the beauty of an agricultural country, perfectly cultivated as to look like an immense garden."

Labor there was cheap, said Dr. Mackay. Four men carried him in a chair for 65¢ a day for all four, and then considered him remarkably generous. Farms averaged from three to five acres, while the man with ten acres was wealthy. They were so well cultivated that not a stone could be found in a field.

After Dr. Mackay's address reports were heard from several churches—alleging that the movement was taking a firm hold on all the congregations.

Austrian Nobleman at Niagara.

HON. DR. PYNE OPENS NEW LIBRARY AT BRAMPTON

Minister of Education Addresses Students, Board and Council—Is Carnegie's Gift.

BRAMPTON, Jan. 24.—(Special.)—Brampton's new public library was opened to-day by Hon. Dr. Pyne, minister of education. The building is of red pressed brick and was erected at a cost of \$12,500, the gift of Andrew Carnegie.

Hon. Dr. Pyne arrived at 2 p.m. He visited the high school and the central public school and delivered a short address to the students. At the new public library building Mayor Golding presided, and an address of welcome was read by W. J. Galbraith, president of the public library board. Hon. Dr. Pyne replied, congratulating the board and council upon the character of the library, and expressed the hope that it would be a valuable annex to the schools of the town. He referred to the growth of public libraries since the first was established in Montreal in 1767. Free libraries were first opened at Halifax in 1864. Galt in 1885 and Toronto in 1884. The education department was doing its best, improving the whole educational work of the province and he felt with considerable success.

"If the doctrine laid down by the finance minister were accepted, what would be the use of the opposition?" asked Mr. Blair.
