A joint committee of the senate and house of representatives of the state legislature of Kansas has prepared a bill dealing with lobbies, and it is now under consideration. It provides that lobbyists shall register with the secretary of state, giving the names of the persons or corporations they are working for, the amount of compensation received and briefly the legislation worked for. No lobbyist is to be hired with pay depending on the passage of the bill in support of which he is employed, nor is he to be allowed to accept a contingent fee for success. Lobbyists are further barred from either house while in session and within 30 days after adjournment lobbyists must file a complete list of expenses with the secretary of state. Any infringement of these provisions it is proposed to punish by a fine of \$5000, a year in a county jail and debarment from acting as legislative agent for a term of three years. This is a salutary measure which ought to pass in Kansas. and be reproduced wherever public rights are assailed or need protection.

ONTARIO AND HER RIVALS.

Ontario's big sister on the Pacific Coast has just declared a surplus in her budget of \$1,388,380. This is for the fiscal year ending last June, and is the largest surplus Hon. Mr. Tatlow has announced in his five years' dealing with the treasury.
