SWINDLED BY REV. ATLAS MAGEDONIANS LAY CHARGE

Claim That Interpreter Secured Money By False Pretences in Two Instances.

No longer can the crown say that there is no sworn information against Rev. George M. Atlas upon which they may base an effort to secure his return to the city for trial upon the many tial position to swindle his ignorant fellow countrymen. Yesterday two warrants were sworn out against him by Macedonians. Both cases were men tioned a week ago in The World.

The warrants charged that he secured \$138.75 from Okle Tausoff, 281 East King-street, and that, also by false pretence, he secured \$81 from Tofel Karstoff, 127 Trinity-street.

Tausoff says that he was a beneficiary under the will of a Macedonian who died last June in the General Hospital and that he got Atlas to look after the matter for him. It appears that they went to Roberston & McLennan, barristers, &cc., in the Canada Life Building, who were the administrators of the estate, and that a cheque was given for the amount which Tausoff turned over Atlas to be cashed. 


