Drury Presents Views.

Premier Drury stated that while he had not come to Ottawa as a special pleader for this cause, he was of the opinion that while he knew there were great difficulties in the way of the work being carried out, the resulting development would more than repay the government for giving the pleas of the deputation the most earnest consideration. The carrying out of the development scheme urged by the deputation would stimulate trade to a great extent and allow northern Ontario to take its proper place as a producer of minerals and other resources. The expense to which the federal government was put in connection with this scheme could, no doubt, be overcome to a great extent by returns from the power which could be developed. Other speakers had dwelt on the market which already prevailed for the power to be developed from such a scheme.

Mr. Drury thought an arrangement could be entered into between the Hydro and the Dominion government which would make a return for the outlay. This scheme was essential to the proper development of the country contiguous to French River. To Premier Meighen, who referred to the litigation now in progress between the Hydro and the Dominion government regarding the Welland Canal power development. Mr. Drury replied that that need not interfere with an arrangement as to an apportionment of the cost of the work in question between the two governments.

Premier Meighen, in reply, pointed out that this was an inopportune time for large expenditures, and that on a capital expenditure of \$27,000,000 or \$39,000,000 fine interest charges yearly would be in the neighborhood of \$2,000,000. The estimated power development would bring in something like \$700,000 to the government, if it sold the power, and this left a large sum to be provided early. 
FARMER'S ESTATE




THE PROPOSED WIDENING OF YONGE STREET AND ITS EFFECT ON TRAFFIC

This street is the least width required on any main traffic-carrying street. T he sidewalks are 20 feet wide, and the roadway is 66 feet wide. After 20 feet has been taken out for street cars there is 23 feet left between the street cars and ea ch sidewall. This space is wide enough for two motor cars or carts of the width now permitted by statute to move at a fair rate of speed, and to provide a safety zone for street car passengers close to the tracks. If this safety zone is provided it should not be necessary for motor care to stop behind a standing street car, W ith ordinary care they can move right along without danger to the street car pas-
