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Work of Salvation Army Women

Commissioner Coombs Opens Home

In South London for the Rescue of the Marys Who Have Sinned.

The new \$12,000 addition to the Salvation Army Rescue Home on Riverview avenue, South London, was formally opened yesterday afternoon in the presence of a large number of citizens.

Dr. Eccles presided, and in a brief address spoke of the excellent work the army is doing.

Addresses were also made by Commissioner and Mrs. Coombs, Col. Stewton, Inspector Sanders, Rev. Dr. Ross, Rev. Mr. Leckey and Dr. Hodge.

The new home is now one of the most complete in Ontario, and has accommodation for cases of all kinds, including a maternity hospital.

Commissioner's Address.

Last night in the Congregational Church a large audience was present when Commissioner Coombs spoke of the "Women's Social and Rescue Work" that is being carried on by the army.

Mayor Stevely presided, and alluded to the rapid growth Salvation Army work has made in this city and in Canada.

After a solo by Lieut.-Col. Pugmire and a selection by the band, Mayor Stevely called upon Commissioner Coombs, who was given an enthusiastic reception, and in speaking of the work said:

All Over the World.

"Our organization has spread itself all over the world, said the commissioner. 'When I came here 24 years ago it was indeed the coming to foreign parts, and I never expected to see any of my friends again.'

"In these days, however, of fast ocean passage it is just like going to see your neighbor. How wonderful it is the change that has taken place so quickly. The army work has spread just as rapidly.

"We have now 125 different branches of Salvation Army work.

General Booth.

"I have just returned from England and the most wonderful sight I saw in my travels was General Booth, at the age of 79, addressing an audience for an hour and a half.

"General Booth had spoken of the splendid reception he had received in Canada and of the pleasure it gave him to come here. In the coming summer he is going to tour South Africa.

"The woman's social work is done among women who have fallen.

"Nearly 6,000 women every year pass through our institutions, their main character made good and refitted for life's battle.

"It is hard enough when a man gets so low that all hope has left him. It is a hard trial, especially if they seek to raise themselves by their own strength instead of going to God.

Rev. Dr. Hamilton spoke of the great work that the army is carrying on, and the great lesson it has taught the churches in applied Christianity.

He endorsed Mrs. Coombs' statements and spoke of the fact that the world will demand the same moral strength in men that it does in women.

Adjutant White, of Toronto, spoke briefly concerning the work that will be done at the new Riverview Home.

The meeting closed with a short address by Col. Sharp.

A Complaint Lodged Against School

A petition has been sent in to the board of education from the residents of that section of the city whose children attend the Princess avenue school, complaining of the sanitary condition of the school.

For some time complaint has been made concerning it, and now the residents of the district have determined to bring matters to a focus and have sent the petition to the board.

Trustee MacRobert, chairman of No. 2 committee, and City Architect Nutter have inspected the school, and Mr. Nutter will make a report on conditions and present it to the board.

It is expected that alterations will have to be made and a new system of heating and sanitation installed.

Short Weight Sharks Infest Market
People Should Buy By Measure or Lb

Only Way for the Housewife To Protect Herself in London.

The question of short weights on the market was again brought up before No. 3 committee last night.

Market Clerk Maker called attention to the fact that short weight potatoes and other produce were being sold on the market and nothing had been done to prevent it.

"This has been brought up before, but nothing has been done about it," he said. "It was the intention to bring it to the attention of the Legislature, but nothing resulted. Something should be done, as there are many complaints."

Ald. Booth's Opinion.

"This matter was brought up last year, and it was sent to the Association of Ontario Municipalities," said Ald. Booth. "This organization was to bring the question before the Legislature, but such was not done. We have also the opinion of the city solicitor on the subject. If a man asks for a pound of butter or a bushel of potatoes, and he is not given the proper weight or measure, he can proceed against the person who sold him the goods; but if he asks for a roll of utter or a bag of potatoes, the purchaser must take chances."

Will Consult Solicitor.

Ald. Greenlees said he would consult the city solicitor as to what could be done. He thought that it would be possible to enact a bylaw covering this matter.

An invitation was received from the secretary of the Chiefs' Association asking that a delegate be sent to the thirty-sixth annual convention to be held in Columbus, Ohio, this summer.

On motion of Ald. Booth and Armstrong, it was decided to recommend that Chief Clark be sent to convention.

The chief thought that the convention would be held the last week of August.

A petition for a light on the corner of Adelaide and Elias streets was received and laid over.

Fire Hall Tenders.

The tenders for the north end fire hall were not opened. They will be opened on Monday evening at 7 o'clock together with the tenders for the south end hall.

John Hayman was awarded the contract for repairing the chimneys of the east end fire hall for \$42.

The tender of Geo. T. Jolly of \$41 for painting the hose tower was accepted.

The tender of H. G. Abbott & Co. of \$29 for painting the chemical engine was accepted.

The Waterous Engine Company was awarded the tender for repairing the boiler of the fire engine.

HANDSOME DINING CARS.
The Grand Trunk Railway System have added to their equipment two new dining cars for service on their lines in Ontario, to be operated on their fast trains between Chicago and Niagara Falls. These cars were built at the Grand Trunk shops in Montreal, and have been greatly admired by all those who have seen them.

The cars are models of elegance, and all modern improvement and appointments known to the designers' art are embodied in these new creations. The exterior of the cars are in the standard Grand Trunk color (bottle green), while the interiors are finished in polished mahogany. The cars are mounted on six wheel trucks, have steel platforms, standard wide vestibules with tandem spring couplers. They are also equipped with high speed slack adjuster quick action air brakes. The cars are equipped with both Pintsch gas and electric light, the illuminating fixtures being both massive and handsome. Accommodation has been provided for the seating of 30 people, special care being taken to provide comfortable chairs, upholstered in leather. The kitchen is roomy and has been equipped with the latest appointments in ranges and cuisine utensils, and the most improved refrigerator plant has been installed in each car. The windows of the car are large, giving the passengers splendid opportunity of viewing the scenery while enjoying their meals. In the dining rooms heavy Wilton carpet is used, while the rest of the floor of the car is covered with tiling. The dimensions of the cars are: Length, over all, 74 feet 6 inches; weight, over all, 127,200 pounds.
