On Parliament Hill

The big event of the week has been the official announcement that the government is to take over the Grand Trunk Railway System of Canada and its unfortunate child, the Grand Trunk Pacific. In comparison with this everything else that has happened this week seems unimportant. It means that we are to have a big national railway with a commanding position in every part of the country. Full credit will be given to Hon. Arthur Meighen, Sir Thomas White, Sir Henry Drayton and others who have labored to bring this about. Quite naturally the government will take, and is entitled to take, whatever glory attaches to the nationalization of the Grand Trunk. Whether Sir Robert Borden be a recent or even reluctant convert to public ownership or no, is unimportant. The fact re-

pel the government to put the measure thru the house under the closure rule. They hope, no doubt, to bring to the assistance the powerful Canadian Pacific Railway Company and other interested parties, a number of whom would scarcely less powerful which fear public ownership and shrink from the advancing tide of railway nationalization.

There will be opposition to the bill when it gets to the senate, and it will not all come from Liberal senators. There is no disguising the fact that the bill will be fought in the upper house by some of their seats in that house to Sir Robert Borden.

If a hard fight is put up against the Grand Trunk legislation it may require the Ontario members to stay closely at Ottawa, although a number of them would like to spend the coming week on the stump.

The railway legislation will undoubtedly have the right-of-way, and the temperance bills may not be proceeded with for the present. It is common talk that they may be sidetracked until after the 20th. A good many people are also of the opinion that the special committee of the hour on the civil re-establishment will delay bringing their report until after the provincial election.

The government is hopeful of making a fair showing in the Dominion by-elections. Should they go right and should the Conservatives make a big win in Ontario, it is altogether probable that some of the senior members of the cabinet may retire and new blood be brought into the line can occur, of course, until the return of Sir Robert Borden, but the general impression is that the prime minister will soon return to the capital in about his usual good health. Another effort may then be made to really get the Unionist party into shape as a permanent organization.

The caucus is a week ago for that purpose made rather a poor impression. The proposed platform was not disclosed to the public until the 20th. It was laid upon the illness of the prime minister. Sir George Foster's speech, of which so much has been said and written, was a moving effort and fitted in well enough with the present universal tendency to weep. But it was a trifle hard on Sir Robert to have attention drawn to his nervous condition. Sir George, however, if all accounts be true, was quite carried away by his own eloquence. He described what a fine, big, strong, healthy man Sir Robert used to be, and dwelt over-long upon the change that had come over him. One man is quoted as saying that Sir George seemed to be delivering an old-time temperance lecture and unconsciously was posing the prime minister in much the same way as he was wont to pose a "horrible example" in days gone by.

On Monday, and again on Thursday, the house discussed the arrangements made by the government for financing and handling the wheat crop of 1919. Judge D. D. McKenzie went off at a tangent when he arraigned the government for prohibiting the export of our wheat to the United States. However, he managed to start a debate on the reciprocity question, which so belatedly the issue that the house fairly lost itself in the labyrinth of date. It was a clean-cut statement by Hon. T. A. Cramer which finally caused the bill to pass without opposition.

Mr. Cramer came again to the rescue of the government in the oleomargarine debate. He supported the government bill upon the ground that the Canadian farmer should make good enough butter to face competition at home as it faced competition in every other country of the world. He assured the Ontario farmers that oleomargarine would not destroy their industry. No country in the world in proportion to its size exported so much butter as Denmark, and yet Denmark permitted the manufacture and importation of oleomargarine.

The spectacle of a government supporter moving the six months' hold for government bill was presented last Thursday when Frank Glass of Middlesex spoke in opposition to the bill per-


