
Ladies Learn the Australian Crawl. Thirty Expert Swimmers Take Their First Lesson in New Stroke.

Employers Avert Railroad Strike

NEW YORK, July 26.—The eastern railroads today withdrew their demand that their grievances against the employees should be considered by the federal board appointed to arbitrate the demand for better wages and working conditions made by conductors and trainmen.

Companies Withdraw Their Demand Which Was the Chief Obstacle. NEW YORK, July 26.—The eastern railroads today withdrew their demand that their grievances against the employees should be considered by the federal board appointed to arbitrate the demand for better wages and working conditions made by conductors and trainmen.

After a brief conference with the labor leaders the mediators announced that the articles of arbitration would present the 16 original demands of the employees without changes. The only point won by the railroads was an agreement that the decision of the arbitrators should become effective Oct. 1 instead of being retroactive.

MOORE PRESIDENT FOR FOURTH TERM OF U. S. GIDEONS

Defeats W. N. Sanderson of New York by Five Votes on Saturday Evening.

MUST WEAR EMBLEM

Enrolment 'Now Over Nine Thousand, Five Times as Many Warriors as Gideon Had.

Unanimously, by a rising vote, Saturday afternoon, A. B. T. Moore, of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, was re-elected national president of the Gideons for the fourth year.

On the first ballot, Mr. Moore was given a majority of five votes over the New Yorker, the ballots standing 64 to 49.

Considerable discussion arose out of the proposal to amend the constitution to make it compulsory that the association emblem should be worn by each member.
