Water and Sewerage Board Sub-Committee Agrees to Give McArthur and McVey \$15,000 More Than Their Contract Price Provided the Work is Done On Time.

At yesterday afternoon's meeting of the for \$18,000. Speaking of the injunction the b-committee of the water and sewerage alderman said he did not attach any value

board it was recommended that the contractors, McArthur & McVey should be given a bonus of \$15,000 over the contract price for section 2 on the water extension, provided the work was completed before November 1. The section relating to extras was discussed at length and it was decided that this additional payment should only be made on condition that it should cover all claims which the contractors might intend to make against the city. The report was adopted, three aldermen dissenting from the view of the majority. The mayor occupied the chair. Ald. Milledge was the only absentee.

The recorder then read the following resolution as the report of the sub-committee:—
