From the Report of the November 24.—At a Meeting of the College Council, at Fredericton, held the 19th day of November, 1829, the following regulations were adopted for the government of both the King's College and the Collegiate Grammar School in Fredericton.

1. That the Grammar and English Schools be henceforth considered as one Academy, under the superintendance of the Principal Preceptor of the Grammar School.

2. That the Principal Preceptor do not hold any Church Preference, nor engage in any Clerical function, which may, in the opinion of the Council, interfere with the discharge of his duties.

3. That the Principal Preceptor shall continue to teach the Pupils under his charge Reading, Writing, the rudiments of English Grammar, Geography and History, together with Arithmetic, Practical Geometry and the Elements of Algebra.

4. That the duties of every day be commenced and concluded with prayer, to be used by the Principal Preceptor, according to the form thereto employed in the Seminary.

5. That every scholar appear in his class clean and properly clad.

6. That no scholar be allowed to sit in the school, who has been expelled by cutting, playing, or otherwise, who be done to the tables, desks, forms, or any part of the building.

7. That the Visiting Committee of the School for the time being shall have power to admit free Scholars, so that there shall not be more than six in the school at any one time.
