## TWO NEW BRUNSWICK MEN AT DARDANELLES

At least two York County men are playing a part in the Dardanelles operations. One of them, Private C. J. Turnbull, who is with the 7th Battalion, Australian Imperial Force, has been wounded and writing to his brother, Alex. J. Turnbull, of Stanley, gives some interesting impressions of the fighting around the Dardanelles.

Private Turnbull's letter was written from the Mena Hospital in Egypt, where he was convalescing from his wounds. He had been in Australia several years before the war broke out. Of the landing of troops at the Dardanelles on April 25 he says:

"When we were landing on Sunday, 25th of April, it was damnable; couldn't believe it till I saw it for myself. A lot of our lads got it, but did not mind—never stopped till a bullet stopped them."

The other York County man engaged at the Dardanelles is James Christie, of Fredericton, who was at one time a railroad engineer in the State of Maine, and was for some years an engineer on the dredges at Fredericton. He is on H. M. transport Cameronian, engaged in carrying troops from Alexandria, Egypt, to the Dardanelles.

## KILLED WHILE BATTERY WAS CHARGING POSITION UNDER TERRIFIC FIRE

Major Anderson Writes of Death of George McDougall of Moncton—Driver Ferguson of Sunny Brae Sends Word of Injuries

Moncton, June 16—Major Anderson, commander of the 8th Battery, replying to a letter from Mrs. George McDougall of this city, gives further particulars of the death of her husband, who was struck by a German bullet during the battle of Ypres. He was killed while the battery was changing position in the face of a terrific rifle fire. He was buried east of Ypres, just south of Julien, and a wooden cross marks the spot. Major Anderson sent Mrs. McDougall a map showing the location of the grave. He had lost a lot of men since McDougall was killed.

H. Ferguson, of Sunny Brae, has received a letter from Doctor Arthur of No. 8 General Hospital, Rouen, giving more details of the wounding of his son, Driver Frank G. Ferguson. He was wounded on April 28 near Ypres, and two days later admitted to the Rouen hospital. At first his condition was extremely grave. His right eye was destroyed, and it was feared that the left would be useless. His face was terribly disfigured, and he was barely conscious. A few days later his left eye assumed normal appearance, and he could see quite well. On May 29 Ferguson was sent to a hospital in London. In a letter to his parents, Ferguson tells of operations on his face. "You won't know me," he says, "with my false face, nose, eye, jaw bone and cheek."

## ADVICE IN SENDING ARTICLES TO SOLDIERS

Toronto, June 16—The following official announcement has been issued by Mrs. Plimpre, secretary of the National Service Committee of Canada:

"Bales for the Canadian War Contingent Association must not exceed fifty-six pounds in weight and should contain only soft goods such as socks and shirts with contents marked plainly on the outside of the bale and protected by water proof material. All other goods as candles, soap, and tobacco, vermin powder, etc., packed in wooden cases not to exceed fifty-six lbs. in weight. A box should contain only one class of article.

"Cables received from England report that ninety-one bales containing mixed contributions chiefly from western Canada have arrived with the contents mixed together and destroyed by water. All those who desire to ship goods for the men in the trenches are earnestly requested to carry out these regulations. Suitable articles, such as tobacco, candles, soap, etc., must be packed in cases plainly marked on the outside.

## TWO FREDERICTON BANK MEN ARE TO DON THE UNIFORM

Chas. Hobkirk and Frank Dunn Joining the 55th—Dr. R. Borden Going to Battle Scene; Bride to Accompany Him

Charles Hobkirk, son of Q. M. Sgt. Hobkirk, barrack master at Fredericton, and Frank Dunn, son of John R. Dunn of Gagetown, are to enlist with the 55th Battalion. Mr. Hobkirk is a member of the staff of the Royal Bank of Canada and Mr. Hobkirk is with the Bank of Nova Scotia. They have obtained leave from both institutions until the end of the war. Mr. Hobkirk recently qualified for the rank of lieutenant at Halifax, but is going in the ranks, having been unable to obtain a commission.

Besides the two brothers, Charles and Ernest Colwell, of Scotchdown, Queens county, four other recruits left Fredericton yesterday for Sussex. The other recruits were E. L. Hunter, William Wilson and Cecil Swan, of Harvey Station, and R. Rossborough, of McAdam Junction. One other recruit, James M. Robinson, of Harvey Station, went to Sussex and will probably enlist there.

Among the Canadian medical men going to the front on active service is Dr. Russell Borden, of Canard, N. S., who recently graduated at Harvard. He will sail from New York for England on next Monday, and will take a bride with him. He was married in Masstown, N. S. on June 17, to Miss Harriet Macnutt of that place, and niece of Collector of Customs Macnutt of Fredericton. Mrs. Borden is a sister of Pte. Clarence Macnutt, of the 18th Battalion Scottish Highlanders, who was wounded at Langemark, and is now in hospital at Bristol, England.

Lieut. Lionel D. Teed, son of M. G. Teed, K. C., is with the 8th Battery of Heavy Artillery at Kingston, Ont. He was a student at the Kingston Royal Military College, and volunteered for foreign service at the beginning of the war.

A lengthy discussion on missionary finances followed, arising from a communication from the Wesley Memorial church, Moncton, with reference to the expenditure of missionary funds within the bounds of the conference. The matter was disposed of, for the present, by a request to the laymen's association to undertake a systematic campaign with a view to inducing the various churches to support their own ministers without appealing to the missionary funds for assistance.

The evening session was devoted to missions and addresses were given by Rev. James Allen, M. A., Mrs. J. B. Gough and Mrs. C. F. Sanford, president of the Women's Missionary Society.

## MORNING NEWS OF THE WAR

The Austro-Germans have captured Mosiska, east of Premysl.

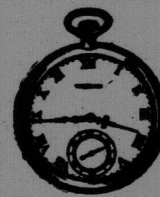
An Allied air fleet yesterday dropped bombs on Karlsruhe for forty-five minutes. It is about 75 miles from the French frontier. They also bombarded other towns, Zabern, Strassburg and Rastatt. The fleet numbered twenty-three aeroplanes.

The New York Tribune charges that Dr. Alfred Meyer, of Germany, privy councillor of first rank is the real name and rank of Dr. A. M. Goldhart, who has recently sailed from New York to Christians, Norway. The Tribune accuses him of violating Red Cross principles, by making his real mission that of a buying agent for Germany and to spy upon United States preparedness for war while posing as an emissary for the Red Cross work.

The Canadian Locomotive Works at Kingston, Ont., has been given an order for fifty locomotives for the Russian government, to cost \$1,250,000.

In 1914 the exports of cultivated rubber from Ceylon totalled 84,653,099 lb., compared with 25,367,028 lb. in 1913.
