Ben Leonard, Calif., May 9—Jeffries made a poor showing in the ring today. Compared with his work of last week, he was slow eye and foot. Seven rounds in all marked the ring work. Three with Joe (Chopki) were featureless, except to show that the former champion was not up to form.

San Francisco, May 9—Johnson today did his first training for his coming fight with Jeffries. He was out on the roads bright and early, with his training partners and the set men for the twelve mile trip was a stiff one. Johnson was not even breathing hard on the return.

The boxing will begin Sunday afternoon and thereafter for at least two weeks he will box Sunday, Wednesday and Friday. Later he will increase the boxing to four days a week.

The track was apparently not as good as in last week's race and the air was heavy but a new Canadian record was made. Cameron won in 22:50, with Corkery only a yard behind.

Lanningan developed Jimmy Recker, and both said Peniston is a better man than any of the past performers were so early in the game.

Peniston will not be at his best for another year. He is only 18 and until he comes into possession of his full power, he will have a chance to improve.
