Art Club Hears Excellent Lecture On Architecture Delivered by W. W. Alward

A very interesting and enlightening address on "Some Aspects of Architectural Design" was given before the meeting of the Saint John Art Club in the Church of England Institute last evening by W. W. Alward and was greatly appreciated by the audience. The lecture was illustrated with many very beautiful lantern slides. W. S. Fisher, honorary president, was in the chair for the opening of the meeting and announced that there were exhibited in the hall a number of the paintings of Alexander Watson which are still available for collectors, as well as a number of the pastel and water color pictures of the work of the late Mrs. Herbert Tilley, which have been presented to the Art School. These pictures were viewed with much interest by those present.

Mr. Alward spoke of architecture in general and stated that the addition of beauty and dignity to the plans of the

structural, electrical, sanitary and other engineers was the function of the architect. He explained the three essentials of architectural design, which were mass, or the giving proper depth to the design, scale and proportion to its illustration in the example of St. Peter's at Rome, which makes a whole design agreeable to the eye and honesty, or the giving of a true indication of the methods of construction. A number of beautiful slides which were lent by the Natural History Society through the courtesy of Dr. William Macdonald, were then shown. They illustrated the massive architecture of Egypt; Assyrian building construction, in which sun-dried bricks were the material used; Grecian architecture where marble was most largely made use of; ancient Roman buildings where the arch was first developed and where concrete was first used; the Gothic of England, Germany and Italy
