REPORTED NEW MUSQUASH DAM RECOMMENDED

Concrete Structure to Replace Wooden One at Big Lake

COMMISSION MEETS HERE NEXT FRIDAY

Plan Spoken of to Follow Inspection of Plant Made Recently

The July meeting of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission will be held here on Friday, July 2, at 9 a. m. It was said this morning by E. A. Schofield, the Saint John member of the commission. Asked as to what was likely to come up at the meeting, Mr. Schofield said that was a matter for the chairman to deal with.

Last week the members of the commission made an inspection trip over the whole Musquash system and inspected the principal dams. It is understood that as a result of the inspection there will be a recommendation to the government that a concrete dam be built this summer to replace the wooden dam at Big Lake, in which a leak developed this spring.

The new dam, it is said, would be built immediately in front of the present structure, and borings have established that a good foundation will be found on which to place the concrete structure.

With the construction of a concrete dam at this point it is understood the commission would have permanent dams holding all the main storage waters.

DINGLEY HAS 305; LARGEST LIST YET

Prince Arthur Joins Boston Service and Reports Many Are Booked

With the largest number of passengers brought here so far this season, the steamer Governor Dingley, of the Eastern Steamship Company lines, that vessel arrived in port this morning from Boston via Eastport, in command of Captain Ingalls. She had 305 passengers and 85 tons of general cargo. Passengers reported and arranged to be taken to the steamer Prince Arthur, of the same line, is expected to sail from Boston tomorrow and arrive here on Thursday morning about 6 o'clock. It will be her first trip this season and it was said that passenger accommodation on her was at a premium. She will sail direct from Boston to Saint John.

Canadian Mail By Air Service

Permission has been granted to the Elliot-Patchell Air Service, Limited,哈利堡, Ont., operating an aerial service three times a week between Halifax, Ont., and Saint John, P. E. I., to convey such mail matter as is offered for conveyance by this service, provided the senders assume all risk.

The requirements for this mail are:

1. "By aerial mail" to be prominently written on the address side.
2. The usual Canadian postage to be affixed on the address side.
3. A special aerial sticker, sold by the company or its agents representing a charge of 25 cents an ounce to be placed on the reverse side in payment of the special charge for transmission by aerial service, which has been fixed by those making the flight.

Auto Visitors To N. B. Increasing

Inquiries continue to pour in to the office of the N. B. Automobile Association here, it was said this morning by Charlton Ferris, secretary of the association. Many of the automobile tourists visiting this part of the Dominion also make it a point to call on Mr. Ferris and discuss the best methods of touring the province. Many who have been here before are coming back this year, it was said, to tour the North Shore and that vicinity. The tourists this year appeared to be of the "money" class, many of them having cars of the more expensive make.

H. L. Marcus Goes On Mediterranean Tour

Hymen L. Marcus left yesterday for New York from which port he will sail on the Cunard Line steamship California on July 1, on a cruise to the Mediterranean. The California will make a regular cruise in that vicinity but Mr. Marcus will leave the vessel at Gibraltar and visit Spain and Austria, rejoining the party again at Athens. Other places he will visit are Alexandria and Cairo in Egypt, and Asia Minor and the Holy Lands. It was expected that he would be away until about September 1.

SHAFT BROKEN

The breaking of the shaft in the hull of the steamer Empress wharf last night about midnight held up loading operations for a time. Arrangements were made for her to use the Eastern S. S. Co. berth to load the balance of cargo for this morning's trip and to take her passengers on board this morning. A new shaft is being made at the Union Foundry and Machine Works and will be installed in time for the return trip of the steamer tonight.

Party Men In Saint John Comment On Situation In Politics of Dominion

OPINIONS on the situation which has developed at Ottawa were asked for by Times-Star reporters today from Saint John men prominent in the Liberal and Conservative parties. Some would not make any comment at this time, but more of the Conservatives than Liberals approached were willing to make statements.

W. E. SCULLY, (Liberal), said that so far as he could see Mr. King had done the only thing left for him to do. He presumed the House would vote supply and then dissolve as had been done in 1911, when the House had voted five-twelfths of the supply for the year.

W. M. RYAN, (L.), said that all he could see was an election in the immediate future. As Hon. Mr. Meighen had criticised Hon. Mr. King for carrying on with a minority in the House he could not very well now form a government himself and continue, as his party were not a majority of the whole House.

R. T. HAYES, (L.)—"Nothing to say as I do not see that I can add anything to what has been said by Premier King."

E. J. HENNEBERRY, (L.)—"I have nothing for publication at present."

DR. L. M. CHURCH, (L.)—"I have no opinion to express on the matter."

DR. W. P. BRODERICK, (L.)—"I have no opinion to express on the situation. There would be no reason for Mr. Meighen to go to the country if he obtains enough support from Progressive voters which he can carry on. That I think is probable. A number of Progressives will support Mr. Meighen to prevent an election and the attendant danger of their not being returned. Mr. King cannot possibly be returned."

MILES E. AGAR, M. L. A. (C.)—"The situation certainly gives one the impression that an early election is in the offing. I do not think that Mr. King will be returned, if an election comes in the House lead me to believe that King's return would be an impossibility."

R. W. WIGMORE, (C.)—"It appears as if we will have an early election. There would be no reason for Mr. Meighen to go to the country if he obtains enough support from Progressive voters which he can carry on. That I think is probable.
