

Hydro Report Discussed.

His Worship said there was two matters in the report of the Civic Power Commission he wished to refer to. The first was the suggestion that the \$53,000 bond issue for street lighting be rescinded, this he felt should come as a recommendation from the Commission rather than from the scretary. The second was that Mr. MacIntyre had been engaged with his approval. He had not known of the engagement of Mr. MacIntyre until after it had been made and then he had approved it, but had not been consulted before the appointment was made. Commissioner Thornton said he felt the order in council had been violated when Mr. MacIntyre was engaged by the chairman of the Commission as this could only be done by the Commission itself.

R. A. Willet, secretary of the Commission, asked what had been done about the request for an appeal to the Public Utilities Commission against the standby charges of the New Brunswick Power Co. of \$2 per kilowatt installed and His Worship said he was waiting for the matter to be taken up by the Commission. 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


