LOCAL NEWS

HARBOR COMMISSION AGAIN.
Mayor Schofield has called a meeting for Friday evening, February 17, at eight o'clock, in the Board of Trade rooms for the purpose of discussing harbor commission.

MRS. ELIZABETH TONER
The death occurred at Mispec on Sunday morning of Mrs. Elizabeth Toner, at the age of seventy-seven years. She was the eldest daughter of the late Joseph Ball. She leaves to mourn two sisters, Mrs. Hugh Toner of Mispec and Mrs. James Lyman of Everett, Mass.

STREET CAR COLLISION.
A collision occurred at Indiantown this morning between two street cars. A Main, King and Britain car was standing on the loop near the fountain when a Prince William car came around the loop and struck it. As the car was moving slowly, the only damage done was the twisting of a fender on one and the breaking of a pane of glass on the other.

CITY WORK.
The engineering department of the city is now starting a crew of men at the work of raising the lines preparatory to the widening of Main street. Rapid progress is being made by the contractors in charge of the work of installing an elevator and steel stairway in city hall. This morning the new stairs were placed in position as far as the second floor.

An event of interest came as a surprise to many friends in the announcement that Carl Brown, son of Dr. and Mrs. Brown of Centreville, and Miss Daphne Fairweather, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edgar H. Fairweather of Hampton, had been quietly married in September. Both young people are favorites and their many friends will wish them much happiness.

MASS FOR LATE POPE
At the request of St. Elizabeth's Society of St. Peter's church, a solemn requiem high mass was sung at 7.30 o'clock this morning for the repose of the soul of the late Pope Benedict XV. Rev. Denis Goll, C. S. S. officiated, assisted by Rev. James Cloran, C. S. S. as deacon and Rev. George Coffin, C. S. S. as sub-deacon. Many members attended and received Holy Communion.

BY-LAW CASES.
John Frazelle, William Frazelle, John Crak, John Harrison, Robert Murray and A. Deornessa pleaded guilty to a charge of doing business in the city without being taxpayers or having a license. Some of them claimed they had not been notified to appear in court Friday morning, and Policeman Gill gave evidence that they had. They were told to stand aside until they could arrange about fines of \$20 each.

CUSTOMS BANQUET
A "get-together" dinner will be held by the staff of the local Customs House, at the La Tour Hotel on Thursday evening. The guest of honor at the dinner will be Charles Gorman, who is one of the staff. It was feared that he would not be home in time for the affair, but Elmer Ingraham of the West Side, received a telegram this morning saying that he would be in the city in time for the dinner.

AT THE HOSPITAL
Patrick Boyle, 287 Waterloo street, a car repairer with the C. N. R. had his foot badly stained this morning and was taken to the General Public Hospital. After treatment he was able to return to his home. Charles H. Magee, who had two of his fingers badly hurt in an accident in the C. N. R. yard Saturday night, was operated on this morning and the fingers amputated. His condition is said to be good.

MRS. JESSIE T. MERRILL
The death of Jessie T., wife of Walter W. Merrill, occurred at her home, Manawash Road, at an early hour this morning, after a brief illness. She was thirty-three years of age and is survived by her husband, one daughter, Mary Jorie, aged five; father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. William Nymmet; two sisters, Mrs. C. Fred McLaughlin of West St. John and Miss Irene, at home; also two brothers, Ira and Percy of Fairville. The funeral will take place from her late residence on Wednesday, February 15, at 2.30 o'clock.

JAMES S. LYON.
Mrs. Bertram Flewelling, of 190 Rodney street, West St. John, received the sad news on Friday of the death of her brother, James S. Lyon, who occurred on February 2, at Libberton, Queens county. He was twenty-two years of age and was a veteran of the great war. He leaves to mourn three sisters and two brothers. The sisters are Mrs. Flewelling, Annie and Viola, at home. The brothers are Arnold H. and Harold H., both of Libberton. The latter is now seriously ill with pneumonia. The funeral took place at Libberton on Friday, February 3, and was largely attended.

JAMAICA WANTS CANADA'S AID
The Jamaica Imperial Association has written the board of trade, expressing its appreciation of the board's offer of co-operation in the expansion of trade between that colony and Canada, and forwarding a resolution covering the position of Jamaica in regard to the Canadian preference. What Jamaica is asking for is a larger preference from Canada to offset the effect of other conditions which affect their business, particularly the sugar industry. It is claimed that while Canada, during the early part of 1921 increased her preference on British colonial sugars from 33 cents per 100 lbs. to 86 cents per 100 lbs. on 96 degrees test refining crystals of 86 cents per 100 lbs. it is not now effectual in bettering Jamaica's position. The letter also states that Jamaicans strongly feel that the abolition of the 15 Dutch standard should be urged.

CHILD KILLED WHEN KITCHEN RANGE EXPLODES

Barrie, Ont., Feb. 13.—Audrey McNeil, daughter of B. F. McNeil, a girl of seven years, met instant death yesterday afternoon when the kitchen range in her home exploded. The accident is said to have been due to the freezing of a water pipe, the fire having gone out during the night.

MEETING SOON ON HYDRO MATTER

Province and Power Company to be Represented.

Will Likely be on Wednesday—A Contract Granted for Heating Apparatus—The C.P.R. Trestle Agreement.

At the committee meeting of the common council held this morning, Mayor Schofield was given authority to have 100 copies of the report of A. Ross, on hydro matters, printed. It was decided to call a special meeting for Wednesday morning to discuss the report. Other matters of a routine nature were disposed of. Mayor Schofield was in the chair and Commissioners Jones, Bullock and Frink were present.

A letter was received from Frank E. Lodge, applying for the position of elevator man at City Hall. He is a veteran who had lost a leg in the great war. The application contained a recommendation from G. Earle Logan, provincial secretary of the G. W. V. A., who said that the applicant would have difficulty in getting a position under the civil service act owing to his injuries. The matter was referred to the commissioner of public safety.

In the absence of Commissioner Thomson, the tender of G. and E. Blake for a steam boiler to be installed in No. 1 Hook and Ladder station at \$1,855 was accepted.

The mayor brought up the matter of the Ross report on hydro-electric. He was given authority to have copies of the report printed, which will be done immediately. The mayor proposed calling a special meeting for Wednesday morning, which would be present Premier Foster and representatives of the N. B. Power Company. Mr. Jones said that Mr. Ross reported some things directly opposite to what Mr. Phillips had found. It would be hard for a layman to come to a decision in the matter. He was in favor of the meeting with the premier and company officials.

The mayor said that if the government and company would take a chance the city ought to be willing to take a similar chance on a trial run of from three to five years.

Mr. Bullock said that he had been disappointed with the report. The people would be able to judge for themselves when the report was printed. The matter was a big proposition but should be disposed of as soon as possible.

His worship said that he would try to arrange for the meeting on Wednesday morning next.

Deposits Forfeited in Liquor Case—Seven Charged with Stealing Coal from C. N. R.

Edward Farren, charged with unlawfully supplying liquor and with obstructing a liquor inspector in the pursuit of his duties, forfeited a deposit of \$400 in the police court this morning. W. M. Ryan appeared for the prosecution.

George Cook, William McAleer, Ernest Bushman, Robert Bree, Joseph Deane and a juvenile pleaded guilty to charges of theft of coal from the property of the C. N. R. Ernest Doucette pleaded not guilty to a similar charge. Miss Margaret Munro said Doucette had been at her house all the day on which he was accused of having taken the coal. They were all sent below to await judgment.

AT ST. PHILIP'S CHURCH
The Rev. W. Constantine Perry of Halifax, who is assisting Rev. Claude A. Stewart in his evangelistic services, preached a most interesting and soul stirring sermon last evening to a capacity house, which resulted in many persons accepting Christ. Mr. Perry spoke on "Why did Jesus raise only three persons from the dead?"

The three persons recorded are the daughter of Jairus, a girl twelve years of age. The widow's son, about twenty-one years of age, and Lazarus, a full grown man.

The speaker said that Jesus restored life to the three classes mentioned, to show His power over death and the grave, over human intelligence, and the possibility of eternal life coming within the reach of all classes and ages. Mr. Perry possesses valuable gifts that will make him a successful evangelist.

"Alone" and "Still Undecided" were two songs sung by the Rev. Mr. Stewart and Mr. Perry, which made a great impression.
