**THE SWISS MONEY MARKET.**  
Why Rates Are Lowest in The World and Exchange at Premium.  
Paris, May 3.—The fact that the Swiss bank rate is the lowest of any in the world and yet that Swiss exchange is at a premium in London, Paris and even New York, continues to attract attention. It is explained by the immense quantities, both of foreign credits belonging to Germans, Austrians, French and Italians, also of foreign stocks similarly owned, which have been deposited in the Swiss banks for safe keeping.

Interest accruing on all these credits is remitted from other foreign countries to Switzerland, and the greater part of such secured interest is left on deposit with the Swiss banks. It thus not only goes to swell the available fund of capital in Switzerland, but makes that country the creditor of the countries on which the bills are drawn or by whom the securities were issued. It is this abundance of deposits which is the real cause for the 91-2 per cent. bank rate.
