THE BUSINESS COLUMN

Wolf Brothers, clothing, of Kansas City, publish a little magazine for their boy customers, called "Knicker". The page is devoted to half-tone cuts of youngsters who patronize the boys' department. Streetcar Blair, director of the store's publicity staff, is editor of the paper and uses a nom de plume of "Tim". In order to touch the youngsters' tender spots for dogs, he has a cut of a conical canine in every issue labeled "Tim's Pup".

Recently the magazine ran a series of articles contributed by prominent business men of the city. The stories were little biographies of their lives and told how they had climbed the ladder to success. Here is a portion of one of the boys' style talks that appeared in the last issue.

"Don't you think it's funny how we boys set the styles? For years we have worn knicker suits and marbles. So I'll tell you right now. Marbles haven't changed much. They're still round. There's something new in knicker suits, but all around and leather buttons, also have tan and gray tweed caps, pleated back. We call these 'Kaper Kaps', so if you want to cut a caper get a sport suit and 'Kaper Kap'.

"Clothes are surely cheaper. Saw a two-piece suit, good wool, gray and tan mixture, belted, \$12.75. A whole suit of clothes from Wolf Brothers for what Dad used to pay for a shirt. Good thing we fellows have tough knees from playing marbles. It's the go now to wear three-quarter coats. They cut tops; browns, heathers, tans. Mother better begin playing marbles."

Sidewalk Level Windows Increase Sales Appeal.

Utilization of formerly wasted space for show window purposes has been raised to the nth power in the new front recently installed by Gray's, men's furnishings, of Salt Lake City. Under the usual expensive windows made to accommodate suits, overcoats, etc., have been built lower-deck windows for the display of hats, ties and other articles of the smaller varieties. The floor of the lower window is a considerable distance below the level of the sidewalk. Hats set on pedestals can be seen by even the casual passerby.

however, he can see not only these more conspicuous articles, but belt buckles, scarf pins, ties, etc., attractively arranged on the floor of the window. The glass slopes so as to give an unobstructed and clear view of the company. J. Will Gray, president and treasurer of Gray Brothers, says the windows are the only ones of their kind in the United States. They have aroused much interest and favorable comment.

Gray's store has only a thirty-foot frontage, but with the arrangement of the windows it has 100 linear feet of display. The lower-deck window is forty-four inches from floor to ceiling. Front glass slopes toward the sidewalk at an angle of forty-five degrees. The woodwork is of quarter-sawn oak, with a silver gray finish. The art glass in each end of the compartment is lighted at night. The signs, with the name of the firm, its caption, etc., are transparent. Reflectors are used so that there are no "spots," and it is possible to see and read the signs for the distance of a block.

The lighting system, with the X-ray reflectors, gives a brilliant but soft effect to the entire display. An island showcase in the centre of the entrance extends eight feet from the doorway. The ceiling of the lobby is to be finished in mosaic tile.

Many customers have been curious to know how the low compartment windows are dressed. The panels which form the back of the window are on hinges and open readily from the rear. They open out into the basement of the store, where a platform has been erected upon which the window dresser stands upright and comfortable while at his work.
