BRITAIN NEEDS A GREAT SUM  
London, April 23.—(Canadian Associated Press)—No surprise is expected in the budget speech to be delivered in the House of Commons on Monday by the chancellor of the exchequer, Sir Robert Horne.

This will be Sir Robert's first budget speech. It is forecasted that expenditures of nearly 1,000,000,000 pounds will have to be met, while other contingencies will bring the revenue required up to 1,128,000,000 pounds.

TWO NEW CENSORS  
One of the clauses in a bill which passed the last session of the local legislature amending the Cinematograph Act, provided for the increase in the charge made for censoring films from fifty cents to \$1 a reel. The act also provided for the appointment of two additional censors and at the last meeting of the government Mrs. Arthur Adams and Mrs. A. C. D. Wilson, both of St. John, were appointed to the positions. In addition to the charge of \$1 made for the first censorship, an additional \$1 will be charged for re-examinations if requested.


LABOR DIFFERENCES
