Lower prices will prevail in the very near future. Currents have advanced in primary markets, but local stocks are unchanged. Sales in the United States of the bean market is very firm and is reported to be heavy but orders from Canada are not as yet going through very freely. The Bee Keepers' Association are holding out for high prices on honey but produce men state their prices are too high and are bringing in New Zealand honey at considerably less money. Oranges are quiet higher and the market for the same is quite firm. Potatoes are scarce at present but this condition is only temporary, due to difficulty in interest being taken by the farmers who are now busy with autumn work. Flour has declined 60 cents to 81.60 per barrel. The price and quality of eggs held in the corn market, together with the recent decline on sugar, tend to make an easier tone in corn syrups and declines on this commodity are not unlikely. One brand of cornflakes which recently advanced have reduced prices to the old basis. The cereal market is quiet and underdone and it has been intimated that

GENERAL ADVANCE IN METAL WARES

(Hardware and Metal, Sept. 4.) Higher prices are reported on a good many hardware lines this week and perhaps the most outstanding feature and the one that will affect most housewives is the advance which has taken place on all wares. Practically everything that is used around the kitchen has been increased in price and new discounts are out on all lines of tin and enamelware iron goods and on nickel plated copper ware. Hardware and Metal were formed by manufacturers that increases material, etc., and all materials entering into make-up of these goods have been hard to obtain.

Higher prices are noted on stoveboards, washboards, also on barbed wire, bay knives, cut glassware, and food choppers. Linseed oil and turpentine have lower prices and another reduction has taken place in price of leather soles and heels. Shortages continue on wire nails and iron pipe and pipe fittings. Canada plate and galvanized sheets are very scarce indeed and dealers are unable to get supplies anywhere. The iron and steel market has already felt the influence of increase in freight rates from the mills. A greater dependence on the part of buyers and sellers is reported. While a slight improvement in transportation is reported, there is still room for a lot more yet as distribution is still poor.

The hardware and paint trade generally report a fair amount of business and booked orders for future delivery are good, although prices do not seem to have declined in hardware commodities and many lines are scarce both jobs and dealers are optimistic and look for a record fall trade. Collections are coming in satisfactory.
