##### Kilbane Signed Up.

Cleveland, O., Jan. 30.—Johnny Kilbane, featherweight champion of the world, has signed to meet Benny Valger, of New York, in an eight round bout at Newark, N. J., on February 16. Valger is to weigh 124 pounds at three o'clock. Kilbane will box at each weight.

##### Champion Matched.

Toledo, Jan. 30.—Jimmy Wilde, the British champion, and Frankie Mason, of Port Wayne (Ind.), have been matched for a twelve-round bout in Toledo the latter part of February for the flyweight championship of the world, according to a telegram received late this afternoon from Ad Thatcher, who went to Milwaukee several days ago to obtain the signature of Wilde's manager to a contract.

##### Briton Won.

Savannah, Ga., Jan. 30.—Jack Britton, world's welterweight champion, was given a referee's decision over Jimmy Conway, of Savannah, at the end of a twelve round bout here today. Britton had the better of his opponent at all stages of the bout.

### WRESTLING.

#### Won Championship.

New York, Jan. 30.—Joe Stecher of Nebraska, tonight won the heavyweight wrestling championship at catch-as-catch-can by defeating Earl Caddock, of Iowa, with a body scissors and arm lock after more than two hours of wrestling.

#### Caddock put up a great battle and it was not until within five minutes of the end that his opponent gained a decisive advantage.

Just before the close of the second hour Stecher secured a body scissors and wrist lock after Caddock made a supreme but futile effort to obtain a half-Nelson. Caddock brought the spectators to their feet when he broke the double hold as his shoulder was barely an inch from the mat for a pin fall. The effort had, however, apparently held him for a moment later he was again gripped in a body scissors and this time both his shoulders went to the mat.

#### The official time was 2 hours 5 minutes and 30 seconds.

### PROVINCIAL CHAPTER IN ANNUAL MEETING

Before the meeting of the Provincial Chapter of the I. O. O. F., yesterday afternoon, Mrs. MacDougall of Toronto outlined the plans for the war memorial scheme, to provide scholarships for the children of men killed on active service or who died of wounds, and to establish post-graduate scholarships in British universities for them. Mrs. MacDougall gave an impressive address in which she was followed with appreciative attention and interest. She told of the work of the order in other parts and said that it had had much to do towards binding the peoples of the dominion more closely together. It numbered 60,000 women, she said, and its power was far-reaching. She said that one of the objects of the memorial of the order would be to help Canadianize the children of the foreign-born in Canada and she explained at length the steps to be taken to this end.

Mrs. MacDougall was tendered a hearty vote of thanks on motion of Mrs. Wm. Pugsley who occupied the platform with her, seconded by Mrs. W. C. Crockett. The provincial secretary, FitzRandolph, after tendering the gratitude of those present, reviewed the work done in New Brunswick in the interests of the memorial scheme. Solos contributed by Miss Valde Fenton were greatly enjoyed.

### 13-Year-Old Coaches For Women Swimmers

New York, Jan. 30.—The child coach is the latest development in swimming for women. Helen Wainwright and Aileen Rignin, the thirteen-year-old aquatic stars of the New York Women's Club, were appointed recently to the task of teaching the beginners of the organization, as well as to help the junior members of the competitive team, and the association will use them as regular members of the teaching staff.

It need be mentioned that the N. Y. W. S. A. employs no professionals whatsoever. Amateurs coach the contestants, and the latter serve in turn as instructors to the non-competing members and prospective team candidates. With the organization growing rapidly in size, the seniors could not meet the increasing demand for their services, and this led to the demonstration of the juniors.

Now that the latter's efficiency has been demonstrated, it is proposed to train other youngsters and form a squad of child instructors.

It is an amusing and interesting sight to watch Helen and Aileen at their new duties. They take very seriously the responsibility placed upon them and give the impression of being thoroughly competent. At first older girls and women accepted them with good humor, but somewhat skeptically. This attitude soon changed to one of confidence, however, and now the little mentors are listened to with attention and are heeded.

The fact is they know watermanship beyond their years in free style, breast and back stroke swimming, fancy diving, plunging and lifesaving, and both have also followed intelligently for a couple of years the up-to-date methods adopted by the organization in all branches of aquatics, so they know them by heart.

Swimming seems to be proving more and more the claim of its devotees that it is the most progressive of sports.
