

CANADIANS RETURN FROM SIBERIA

Vladivostok, April 22.—(Canadian Press)—The steamer Montevideo sailed from Vladivostok yesterday for Vancouver with 1,100 Canadian troops on board. An American regimental band played the returning Canadians away. Their passage is expected to take 15 to 18 days.

AGREE TO TERMINATE GERMAN'S RIGHTS IN CHINA

Paris, April 22.—The council of four decided today to discontinue its hearing on the Chinese and Japanese claims to rights in Shantung province, and agreed merely to terminate Germany's rights in the peace treaty, leaving the settlement of the respective rights of China and Japan to the German concessions until a later date.

D. C. Clark Again Grand Master Of Masonic Order

Deals With After-war Problems in Annual Communication—Urges Support For New Protestant Orphanage

The Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons assembled in the Masonic Temple yesterday for their fifty-second annual communication with Grand Master D. C. Clark presiding.

In his annual address Grand Master Clark spoke of the happy ending of the war, and of the new problems that the citizens have to face with the signing of peace. Already over one hundred thousand men have returned to Canada. Many have returned broken down in health and shattered nerves. It is true that a certain number of men have had their positions held open for them, but the large majority of those coming back have to seek work in the open labor market.

Mr. Clark next spoke of changing industrial conditions, of the readjustment of trade and industry to meet the new conditions, declaring in all of these moments of crisis, I feel confident that the members of our Noble Order will give their best thought. They will not allow themselves to become extremists, but will use their best endeavors to solve these present and live questions, so as to promote the common good of all.

The United Grand Lodge of England is the Mother Grand Lodge of Free Masonry. It is making plans to mark the declaration of peace by a great celebration in London in June next. The celebration will extend from the twenty-third at the shrines of the month, through the Grand Master and Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge have been invited to be present.

Feeling reference was made to the death of members during the year. In speaking of the movement on foot to provide a suitable Protestant orphanage in this province, Mr. Clark said that he was in favor of it, and recommended that the matter be strongly considered by the Board of General Purposes.

He expressed satisfaction that the fund of benevolence had reached the splendid figure of \$18,000. J. Twining Hart, the Grand Secretary, reported the receipts from the subordinate lodges had amounted to four thousand and sixty-eight dollars and seventy cents, a total exceeding that of last year. The total membership to 27th December, 1918, was 3,988.

The managing committee through a D. Ellis, reported several changes that had been made to the Masonic Hall, which necessitated considerable expenditure, of increased rentals, damage done by fire, etc.

MORE EXPLOSIVE IS USED IN LAWRENCE

Two Tenement Houses Blown up But no One is Hurt

Lawrence, Mass., April 22.—Two explosions, an hour apart, shattered windows and doors in tenement blocks and threw mill workers and their families into a state of excitement last night. No one was injured. The police were unable to find any clue to the cause.

The first explosion occurred in an eight tenement house, opposite the Everett mill. Apparently explosive had been placed under an outside stairway at the rear of the building. A child in bed was showered with glass from a broken window, but was unhurt.

An hour later there was a similar explosion at a house in South Lawrence, to miles away from the scene of the first one and near the United States Wool mill. One man was knocked down and a door was blown over on him but he escaped injury.

MONCTON WANTS \$500,000

It was decided by the Moncton city council last night to apply to the Dominion government for \$500,000 under the Dominion government act to give better housing facilities. Mayor Price, E. A. Beilly, A. J. Tingey, W. M. Thompson and Clement Cornier were appointed as a committee to administer the loan in accordance with the terms of the act.

TO RISK DEATH AGAIN ON SOUTH POLE EXPEDITION

Cope, Who Nearly Lost Life in 1916, Proposes to go Back Next Summer

London, April 22.—Another antarctic expedition is being prepared for, according to a statement in this morning's newspapers, John Cope, biologist with the British antarctic expedition of 1914-1917, will be leader and expects the expedition to start in June 1920.

He proposes, besides carrying out scientific investigations to ascertain the extent of mineral and other valuable deposits on the antarctic continent. He has secured the exploration ship Terra Nova and intends to make an airplane and hopes to make a flight to the South Pole. Cope and eight comrades narrowly escaped death when the Aurora, a rescue ship sent for the Shackleton party in 1916, broke her moorings and left them on the great ice barriers surrounding the antarctic continent.

EIGHT DISTINCT HEALTH OFFICERS

Health Centres Will Also be Established—Very Progressive Legislation in Neighboring States

Augusta, Me., April 22.—Dr. Leverett D. Bristol, the state commissioner of health, declares that he feels that the people of the state should be congratulated because of the progressive health laws passed by the recent legislature which places Maine in the front ranks of public health administration.

Under an act passed by the legislature which just adjourned, the state department of health will be able to employ more district health officers, that is, men who are well trained and who will devote all their time to the work, beginning with next year. It is the plan when the law becomes operative to have a district health officer for every two counties, that is, eight in all throughout the state.

At present there are but three health officers in the great state of Maine, A. P. Pratt of Portland, Dr. D. Worth at Bangor, and Dr. J. P. Stevens at Millinocket.

New legislation provides that towns may join and employ the same full time trained health officers on the same principle as towns now employ a superintendent of schools. There is also a provision in this act that financial assistance will be given to a town or group of towns in unions by the state to the extent of \$500 per year if they will employ a full time health officer, the idea being to encourage the employment of trained men on a full time basis. Starting with the year 1920, the state department of health, under an act passed by the recent legislature, will have more centralized authority over boards of health and health officers.

The legislature also made an increased appropriation for the control of disease to match the \$6,000 per annum which is given by the federal government. A part of this money is to be used to establish what are called health centers in several large communities. One has already been located at Portland and Bangor and one will be started at once in Augusta, Lewiston and some part of Aroostook county. Health centers are expected to be of great value to a community, for people can go there to seek prevention and obtain facilities for treating various contagious diseases.

WAS VICTIM OF TUBERCULOSIS

Killed Wife and Her Lawyer and Self Because She Would Not Live With Him

At Hoquiam, Washington state, recently, Sidney Moor Heath, pioneer Hoquiam attorney, and Mrs. Aileen A. Sedgwick were fatally shot in the lawyers' office in the First National Bank building by the woman's husband, who then turned his revolver on himself, ending his life with a bullet through his head. Mrs. Sedgwick died in about half an hour. Mr. Heath lingered for about two hours, dying at the hospital where he was rushed as soon as the crime was discovered.

That Sedgwick followed his wife to Mr. Heath's office, with the intention of murdering her and of ending his own life, was indicated by a letter found on his person. Whether he became frenzied because Mr. Heath was advising Mrs. Sedgwick, or shot him without any premeditation, is unknown. Sedgwick had left a sanitarium for tubercular patients at Aldercrest, Snohomish county, only a few days ago, and his letter shows he had given up hope and was determined since his wife would not return with him to Snohomish, or permit him to take their two small children, to kill her and take his own life.

Letter Shows Crime Planned.

The reason for the murder of Mr. Heath is unexplained, but that the slaying of his wife and his own suicide were deliberate, was shown by an unsealed letter, written by Sedgwick since his arrival here and addressed to his brother, Geo. Sedgwick, 1609 Fulton avenue, Everett, and found in his pocket. It follows in part:—

"Have been here several days trying to fix things with Louise so we can live together again, but she will not have it that way. I have consulted a lawyer and he tells me that no court will compel a woman to live with a man who has tuberculosis, and as that is the main reason for Louise leaving I am up against it. The lawyer tells me that the court might award the children to Louise on that account also, so with my health gone, what have I to live for? (Nothing.) So I am going to end it all. I am going to take Louise with me. We were good pals once. If Louise and I die together it is my wish that we be buried at Everett. My insurance will take care of part of the expenses."

CHARGE GIRL WITH HELPING IN ESCAPE OF PRISONER

Toronto, April 22.—Vera Lavelle, a girl who is alleged to have been implicated in the escape of Frank McCullough, who was to have been hanged on May 2 for murder, was arrested last night. McCullough escaped from the Toronto jail.

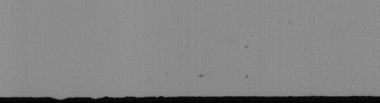
Still No Flight.
