Boston, July 17.—After being on No Man's Land wounded and unconscious for three days, Private William C. Dunphy of 56 Hamilton street, Dorchester, was picked up by a French patrol and taken to an American base hospital behind the lines where his wounds were treated. Such was the information received by J. Dunphy, the father

of the boy, concerning the whereabouts of his son who was reported missing on May 31, after going over the top for the third time, in a letter written to him by one of the boy's friends who is in the same company. Dunphy is a member of K Company of the old Ninth, now the 191st.

War Garden Bulletin

PRACTICAL DAILY GUIDE FOR VACANT LOT AND BACK-YARD GARDENERS ENLISTED IN GREAT-ER PRODUCTION CAMPAIGN

Issued by the Canada Food Board in Collaboration With Experts on the Staff of the Dominion Experimental Farm

SOME ILLS AND THEIR CURES.

The insect world is at its busiest these days in the war garden and it is important that the pests be given attention just as soon as they appear. Delay in spraying or removal may prove fatal. The following table may help the war gardener to make the best of his best crop.

Leaf Spot—(Red and purple spots, turning ash gray).
Remedy—Spray with Bordeaux mixture when plants are 8 to 4 inches high, repeating two and four weeks later.

Web worms—(Eats the leaves).
Remedy—Spray with arsenate of lead when worms appear; repeat when necessary.

Spinach aphids—(Sucks sap from leaves).
Remedy—Spray with nicotine sulphate when pests appear and repeat when necessary.

Beet-root aphids—(Sucks sap from roots).
Remedy—Pour a small amount of nicotine sulphate spray around roots and repeat if necessary.

WILL PORTFECT BABIES' SIGHT

Ontario Board of Health Passes Measure Affecting Infants

Regulations seeking to prevent babies' sore eyes have been drawn up by the Ontario Board of Health and approved by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council. Sore eyes and blindness in babies have been too common, and the department hopes by enforcing these regulations to eliminate much of this unnecessary suffering.

It is provided that every physician in attendance at the birth of a child, shall instill into the eyes of the baby a few drops of a 1 per cent. solution of nitrate of silver, or a 40 per cent. solution of argyrol. If within two weeks after the birth of a child, one or both eyes become reddened, inflamed, swollen or show any discharge, every attendant is required to

make a report in writing to the Medical Officer of Health, with circumstances of the case. Upon receiving the report the medical officer of health is required to place the child under the required care of a qualified physician, if this has not been done. When the parents are unable to defray the cost of such medical attention the medical officer of health is required to provide the necessary treatment, the cost being charged to the municipality. It is also provided that the local boards of health must be notified of the case coming to their attention. The nitrate of silver solution is supplied free of cost by the Provincial Board of Health. Rules for the guidance of doctors and attendants, both before and after the child is born, are attached to the regulations.

SUGAR CARDS TO END PRACTICE OF HOARDING

(Bangor Commercial.)
Hoarding of sugar, which has been a popular sport among those who have been sufficiently well posted as to the location of stores that have had stocks of sugar from time to time, is practically abolished by the sugar card system in Bangor and Brewer, which is already proving a success. Under the old plan, certain people went from store to store buying up all the sugar they could, while others, who didn't think so much about it, had a hard time to buy a pound or two when they needed it badly. The hoarding plan was one cause of the continual scarcity of sugar. With the card plan, an equitable distribution is assured.

The rush of dealers to the Chamber of Commerce for sugar cards continued Saturday. Nearly 10,000 cards have been issued to dealers in Bangor and Brewer for distribution to their customers. The cards are issued numbered serially by the Chamber of Commerce and recorded there. When the grocer gives a card to a customer, the name, address and number of pounds allowed weekly is put on record, and a complete list of all cards furnished is then turned in to the Chamber of Commerce. In case more than one member of a family secures sugar cards by going to different stores, the cards will be withdrawn and their case will be referred to the Federal food administrator for Maine. In other words, play the game fair, or face the responsibility of going without sugar entirely, is Food Administrator Merrill's admonition.

Sugar cards are independent of the special certificates being issued by the grocers and not at the Chamber of Commerce for securing sugar for canning and preserving.

The cards for the towns in the county outside of Bangor will begin to go out Monday and the same penalties for violating the rules will prevail as in Bangor.

HOW BUTTERFLY ESCAPES

Brilliant Wings Folded Back When it is at Rest.

The vivid and beautiful markings of the butterfly's wings are often a puzzle to those who would find in the coloring of animals a means to low visibility. The butterfly, thanks to his gorgeous splendor, is a most conspicuous object, especially from above, whence chiefly danger would come in the way of insect eating birds.

The butterfly's illuminated wings seem to be designed for the attraction of mates, and have developed through this potent principle despite the dangerous prominence they give the insect, who uses other means to counteract it. When flying the butterfly takes a pe-

culiar zigzag path, which, as submarine-careful ships know, is a proper means for eluding danger. A butterfly in flight is a difficult object to stalk, notwithstanding the slow rate of locomotion.

When the butterfly is at rest, it folds its wings over its back, so that only the drab, protectively colored lower surface is visible. In this posture the insect is of very low prominence from any angle. The moth, unlike the butterfly, flies at night. Obviously, bright coloring would be of no purpose in attracting mates. The moth is garbed in dull tints which render it inconspicuous during the day, its period of rest.

There is no need of hiding the upper surface of its wings, so a convenient means to distinguish moths from butterflies is the fact that the latter, when at rest, fold their wings above their backs as stated, while the former spread their wings out flat.
