MAY GO BACK HOME WITH WIFE HE LEFT TO ELOPE WITH OTHER

Niagara Falls, Ont., March 17.—Through the good offices of his jilted wife, Rev. J. T. W. Williams, eloping Congregational preacher from Newcastle, Pennsylvania, may return to that place, and a white elephant is taken off the hands of the Canadian immigration department.

Williams was arrested in Toronto on February 19 in company with the wife of George Thomas, a Newcastle grocer, on a charge of entering Canada under false pretences. He was brought here and convicted, and the intention was to deport him to the United States. The immigration authorities of Niagara Falls, New York, however, refused to accept him on the ground that he was not a citizen of the United States and was subject to exclusion from that country.

It was learned that he was a native of Wales, and a resident of the United States of less than two years. It seemed evident that the Canadian Government would have to convey him back to the land of his birth, if he were to be got rid of at all, and arrangements to do so at the public expense were pending when word came that he might be escorted across the bridge to American soil.

Mrs. Williams, it appears, made an appeal at Washington for the restoration of her spouse, and a special ruling has been made in reversal of the order of the immigration authorities at Niagara.

THE ROSARY

Play at Opera House Tonight

"The Rosary," written by the well known author, Edward E. Rose, will be presented at the Opera House tonight by the Thompson-Woods Stock Company with Mr. Moloney in the part of Father Kelly, created by John Meehan. Miss Brandt will be seen in the difficult dual role of Vera and her twin sister. The book and the song of the same name have long been popular and the play has been a dramatic sensation since its first production.

"The Rosary" is a sermon, as good as has ever been preached. It beseeches forgiveness for sin, justice instead of revenge, and plants firmly in one's heart the spirit of goodness. Its good should be bountiful, its spirit, far-reaching. The story of ruin with which the play deals is brought about wholly by implication. It shows the working of the human mind when night infests it; it shows strongly the effect once the seed of suspicion has been sown, and all by ideas, not by word of mouth. While the story is dramatic throughout there is sufficient comedy interspersed to ease the tension. "The Rosary" should be witnessed by all, religion notwithstanding. It is a power for good. The performance will be found thoroughly enjoyable.

SAYS SHE TRIED 22 TIMES TO PUT END TO HER LIFE

Brooklyn, N. Y., March 17.—In the supreme court here, Herman E. Atkins, a photo engraver, began action against his wife, Erna Atkins, for separation. Atkins asserted his wife had tried to end her life twenty-two times during the year and seven months they had been married.

Justice Kayser granted Mrs. Atkins \$10 a week alimony and \$50 counsel fees, pending trial.

PENSIONS IN AUSTRALIA

Mr. Knibbs, commonwealth statistician, dealing with the old age pensions in Australia, says that in its invalid and old age pensions scheme Australia makes more liberal pension provisions than any other country in the world. Approximately 1-4 per cent. of the population of Australia has the age qualifications requisite for an ordinary old-age pension. Of those having the requisite age qualification, 88 per cent. are in receipt of old age pensions. The number of old age pensioners in Australia represents 1-8-4 per cent. of the total population.

Daily Hints For the Cook

Mock Cherry Pie

Cut open 1 cup of cranberries and pour cold water over them to remove seeds, then drain. Take 1-2 cup chopped raisins, 1 cup sugar, 1-2 cup boiling water, 1 tablespoon cornstarch dissolved in cold water, 1 tablespoon vanilla. Boil all together a few minutes until berries are done. This makes one pie in deep plate with two crusts.

Fruit Marble Cake

Cream two-thirds of a cup of butter; add gradually two cups of sugar and the beaten yolks of three eggs, then alternately one cup of milk and three cups of flour, sifted with one teaspoon of soda and two teaspoons cream of tartar and one salt spoon of salt. Flavor with lemon, fold in the stiffly beaten whites and put half of the mixture in a long narrow pan. To the remainder add one tablespoon of molasses, one teaspoon of cinnamon, half teaspoon each cloves and allspice, one cup of chopped raisins mixed with one tablespoon of flour. Spread over the white part and bake in a moderately hot oven. This will make two large loaves.
