FAILURE OF THE CANADIAN LOAN

Conditions Which Led to 90 Per Cent of Issue Being Left With Underwriters

(Times Special Correspondence.) London, June 29.—While it was not expected that the Canadian loan would be a complete success, the city was not prepared for the result which left nearly ninety per cent of the issue in the hands of the underwriters. At the same time the reaction given to the Canadian loan cannot be regarded as a fair indication of the feeling here. Unfortunately the subscription to the loan synchronized with two city suspensions which, in spite of all the published assurances to the contrary, introduced a situation that held all the elements of a panic.

Fortunately the men handling the affair had strong hands and were successful in heading off the evil. The aftermath of the failures in the shape of the published statements of the companies having financial or corporate association with the firms who have suspended payment proves that the situation was handled with extraordinary skill. Had these statements been published at the same time as the announcements of suspension of payment a condition bristling with difficulties would have been created. So it was that the Canadian loan came into the field at a time when, if there

was not a hostile tendency towards Canadian investment, there was certainly a determination to wait until the clouds cleared. There was also a widespread anxiety as to Canadian holdings generally, and small investors even made inquiries as to whether municipalities of Vancouver, Winnipeg, Montreal, and the other large Canadian cities were safe; exceedingly foolish of course but only the fear always brought into being in a time of financial stress.

The street has got over the trouble and a temporary recovery occurred. Apathy has, however, again stepped in and there is a stoppage of investment business almost unparalleled. The public is hoarding its money as is well shown by the fact that the joint stock banks have no less an increase than fifty million pounds in their deposits as compared with a year ago. This constitutes the most satisfactory feature in the present condition and competent judges of the financial barometer believe that a marked revival in investment activity cannot long be delayed.

The public cannot much longer hoard up its capital; the spirit of caution cannot continue indefinitely and, as is well known, repression is always followed by increased activity. When the present pessimism gives way to a more sane outlook there will be a boom, say the insiders, and a careful survey of the conditions supports that view.

RECORD PRICE FOR DRY COD FISH

Halifax, June 30.—Recent sales of the spring catch of codfish brought the highest prices ever found, namely: 88 a quintal. Quite in contrast with the no-stock conditions of a month ago is the quickening movement of the markets along the Nova Scotia coast.

The few scattering days of sunshine bore fruit in quite a number of arrivals of small craft at Halifax from nearby fishing stations with early spring catch of codfish. These found ready sale along the water-front at 88 a quintal for large fish. This is the highest price ever obtained at this season of the year for the spring product.

IN PINK TIGHTS, SHE CHASES THIEF IN STREET; CATCHES HIM

While on Trapeze Girl Sees Burglar Stealing Jewelry in Theatre

New York, June 30.—Miss Henrietta Heno, star trapeze performer at Low's Liberty Avenue Theatre, East New York, was causing thrills to the audience when she suddenly happened to look towards the wings in the direction of her dressing room and there riling a table of her jewelry she spied a man.

Miss Heno was swinging from the rear of the stage far over the heads of the audience. A rope was within reach as she plunged through the air and this she seized and held herself fast to the footlights. Others in the act knew something was amiss, but what they could not guess. To their wonder Miss Heno rushed off the stage.

One glance at her dressing table showed the athletic young woman that jewelry valued by her at \$8000 was

missing. She ran to the stage door, but no one was there. The thief must have left by the passageway behind the boxes.

Clad as she was, Miss Heno rushed to the main entrance of the theatre. In the lobby she saw the man whom she had seen in her dressing room. He was just walking out of the door, but when he saw Miss Heno he broke into a run.

With a cry "Stop thief!" the plucky little performer rushed after the stranger. Her attire, her apparent earnestness and her cry caused many to join with her in pursuit, and in a few seconds Liberty Avenue was thronged with people, rushing after a flash of pink fleshings and a fleeing man. By the time he had run four blocks he was grabbed by Miss Heno.

In the chase were two detectives, and soon the fugitive was safely on his way to a cell. He was searched and in his pockets were found not only Miss Heno's bag of gems, but ten watches and other jewelry valued at \$2000. A loaded revolver and a bottle of heroin were also found.

The prisoner was sullen but when the heroin was taken from him he became possessed of almost demon-like strength. He cried finally, when overpowered, that he must have the drug, but his appeals were ignored. His name, he said, was Charles Curran. He gave his age at 24 years, and said that he lived at Coney Island.

Curran is suspected of many other burglaries in playhouses throughout Manhattan and Brooklyn. He had access to all theatres for in the lapel of his coat he wore a pin with the initials "T. M. U."—abbreviations for the "Theatrical Mechanics' Union." He also had a pass of the White Rats Actors' Association, signed by the name of Willis J. Cook.

Miss Heno, after seeing that the burglar was locked up and that she would not, after all, lose her jewels, remembered about her attire. It was then she blushed and hurried back to her dressing room.
