## **Germans Attack Again** And Again on Allies' Left But Are Repulsed

**Official Report Today Meagre But Satis**factory - Austrians Did Not Sink French Warship — Germany Loses More Territory

Paris, Sept. 29-"On our left wing along the River Somme," the French official statement issued this afternoon says :-- "The Germans attempted numerous attacks, which the allies repulsed."

Washington, D. C., Sept. 29-Official denial of the sinking of a French warship by the Austrian forts at Cattaro was made today by the French admiralty through the embassy here.

"The French secretary for the navy has made known tirely false and that there is nothing to justify such a report. Up to date (September 28),) no French warship has been touched by an Austrian projectile," said the admiralty's statement, which attributed the report to the Cologne Gaz-
