ATTEMPT TO KILL RUSSIAN PREMIER

BOMB EXPLOSION AT HIS COUNTRY HOME

Twenty-Eight Persons, Including M. Stolypin's Daughter, are Dead and Twenty-Four Injured.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 25.—Twenty-eight persons are dead and 24 others injured as the result of a dastardly attempt this afternoon to assassinate Premier Stolypin with a bomb while he was holding a public reception at his country house on Aptekarsky Island.

The Premier was slightly wounded in the face and neck by flying splinters. Among the dead are the Premier's 15-year-old daughter, who had both legs broken by the explosion and subsequently succumbed to her injuries.

Whether the assassin who entered the crowded reception hall threw the bomb is not known, as all the immediate eye-witnesses were killed.

Details of Outrage. St. Petersburg, Aug. 25.—Four revolutionists arrived at M. Stolypin's villa on Aptekarsky Island at 2:30 p.m. today in a coach.

One of the men threw a bomb into the reception room and a terrific explosion followed. The house was nearly destroyed. The man who threw the bomb was instantly killed, but the Premier, who was in his office, was unhurt.

Many lacerated corpses and a large number of wounded and mutilated persons were lying around the spot where the bomb exploded. Fifty-two persons were killed or wounded.

Report of a Cannon. St. Petersburg, Aug. 25.—Later details show that the authors of the outrage drove up to the Premier's residence after the list of visitors had been closed.

COUNTRY HOUSE SET ON FIRE BY PEASANTS

Victim Was Unable to Escape From Burning Building—Captain and Two Policemen Killed.

This, Aug. 26.—The country mansion of Prince Palavandoff at Okoni was set on fire by peasants last night. The princess was unable to escape and was burned to death.

Rebecca S. Molefsky, aged 12 years, one of the Jewish orphans, told at Ellis Island how her parents were whipped to death by Cossacks in the public square at Chisinau.

TWO HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS

ESTIMATE OF PROPERTY LOSSES AT VALPARAISO

Heavy Rain Adds to the Sufferings of Homeless People in Devastated City.

Santiago, Chili, Aug. 25.—A conservative estimate places the property losses at Valparaiso as the result of the earthquake and fires at \$200,000,000.

The loss in the rural districts will be immense, as not only the residences of the landed proprietors but the huts of the laborers have been completely destroyed and in many places the bridges, and telegraph and telephone poles have been thrown down.
