This brought him into collision with no less a person than Bismarck, who challenged 'him to a duel after Vir-chow had managed to defeat the Prus-sian ministry's proposals for the cre-ation of a navy. He resigned his seat in parliament in 1878, but his frank ex-pression of ultra-liberal views brought about his dismissal from the rectorship of the university in 1887. His best known writings deal with chelera (1848-9), typhoid fever, trichin-osis (1860), typhus in Hungary in 1868 and the pathology of tumors. Though subsequent investigations have shown some of his positions to be untenable or to require modification, actentists are fully agreed as to the great merit and value of his life work.
